POLICE BEAT

Police Department's Citizen Police Academy

Bartlett Police Department will be hosting its next Citizen Police Academy starting on Tuesday, 9/3. The purpose of the Citizen Police Academy is to provide residents, owners or employees of a business in the Village with a better working knowledge of the police department. Participants can anticipate a fun, challenging and educational experience, designed to foster and enhance positive relationships with the members of the department.



The Citizen Police Academy is a free, 9-week program that meets every Tuesday evening from 6 until 8 p.m. in the Bartlett Police Department's new police facility. Selected individuals participate in a series of classroom discussions, demonstrations, interactive scenarios and practical exercises.

The class size is limited. A random draw is used to select the participants if there is an overwhelming demand. Applicants must be at least 35 years old and be a Bartlett resident or an owner or employee of a business in the Village, who can commit to attend the entire 9-week program.

Back to School Safety & Bartlett High School Homecoming Parade

Wednesday, 8/14 is the first day of classes for U-46 and many other area students. Drivers are reminded to obey school speed zone signs, refrain from using their cell phones and pay extra attention to

students walking to and from school.

If you are driving behind a school bus, allow a greater following distance than you would when driving behind a car. It will give you more time to stop once the yellow lights start flashing.

It is illegal to pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children. If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic traveling in both directions must stop. Be alert; children often are unpredictable, so it is up to drivers to be extra vigilant.

With the return of school days come special school events. The police department will be helping to direct traffic during the Bartlett High School homecoming parade scheduled for the afternoon of Sunday, 9/15. Please check the Village website closer to the event date for more details about the time and a map of the parade route.

Prescription Drug Drop Off

During 2018, the police department collected 548 pounds of unused or expired medication for safe disposal. Eleven 30-gallon drums were dropped off at the DuPage County Health Department to be destroyed.



Bartlett's FREE Drug Drop-Off events are typically held at Bartlett Village Hall's main office on the last Saturday of each month, (unless there is a holiday) from 9 a.m. to noon. Please remember, NO SHARPS or INHALERS will be accepted. You may dispose of sharps safely by placing them in a sealed laundry detergent container and throwing it in the garbage.



A Minute with the Mayor

"What did you do during your summer vacation?" I hope that a special group of students from Bartlett High School answer that question with a positive report about the time they spent with the Village of Bartlett.

This is the second year that the Village worked with School District U-46 and the Alignment Collaborative for Education (ACE) to offer summer internships to high school students with the goal of fostering skills that will help the teens succeed in college and the workforce.

This year, the Village hosted 12 students in various Village departments. In the building department, they worked on researching other communities' building codes, to help update Bartlett's code. The community development interns helped scan floor plans of buildings in Brewster Creek Business Park, which will be made available to first responders in the event of an emergency. They also accompanied code enforcement staff on site inspections for landscaping and code violation complaints.

The Bartlett History Museum benefitted from the help of intern Garima, who sorted, numbered and uploaded photos for the museum's collection. She also helped prepare and mount postcards for a new exhibit. Students Pooja and Kosha, assigned to public works, installed "no dumping" markers on storm drains in the Lakewood Mills subdivision. These markers notify people that these storm inlets drain to

waterways, so anything that gets dumped down them affects wildlife.

The GIS interns worked on using a GPS unit to collect data about Village owned storm, sanitary and water assets throughout the Village. This information is part of a project to update and verify the location of every asset the village owns.

In the administration department, intern Shriya worked on researching business license information from neighboring municipalities to help update Bartlett's business license costs. She also created a Bartlett business spotlight video.

Let me say once again, the Village is extremely grateful to U-46 and ACE for helping to set up this incredible initiative. For the second year in a row, this internship program has not only given students a tremendous opportunity to step into the real world, but the students have given the Village long-lasting, quality work.

Village staff continues to be blown away by the thoughtfulness and maturity of these students. We thank them for their time and wish them well as they start a new school year.





During the warm summer months, the Bartlett Police Department tends to see a rise in burglaries to motor vehicles. While police take proactive measures to combat this trend, there are simple things that residents can do to help prevent theft from your vehicles:

- * lock your vehicle and take your keys with you
- * secure your valuables - never leave them in plain sight! Take anything you can't afford to lose with you, such as wallets, purses, cell phones, laptop computers, etc.

In many cases, a thief simply walks from car to car at night and tries the doors, taking anything they deem worthwhile from the unlocked cars. In this way, they are able to steal many items quickly, while making virtually no noise. If the car doors are locked and they don't see anything of value inside, they simply move on to easier targets.

Be vigilant of your property and help out your neighbors. If you see anything suspicious, be sure to call 9-1-1 promptly. Also, if your vehicle is burglarized, please do not go through it before police can collect evidence.

Together, you and the Bartlett Police Department can reduce opportunities and catch these thieves!



You Must be 21 to Buy Tobacco in Illinois

Effective July 1, 2019, you must be at least 21 years old to buy tobacco in Illinois, including cigarettes, chewing tobacco, e-cigarettes and vapes. Governor JB Pritzker signed the initiative, known as Tobacco 21 on April 7, 2019.

Tobacco 21 will help keep tobacco out of high schools. Most underage tobacco users rely on social sources like friends and family to get tobacco. Approximately 90% of those who supply cigarettes to minors are themselves, under the age of 21.

According to national data, about 95% of adult smokers begin smoking before they turn 21. Tobacco 21 policies could reduce overall smoking by 12% by the time today's teenagers become adults. The biggest decrease in tobacco use could be among youth ages 15-17 (25%) and 18-20 (15%).

In addition to prohibiting the sale and sample distribution of tobacco products, e-cigarettes, and alternative nicotine products to individuals under age 21, the law:

- * Requires tobacco and e-cigarette retailers to update all posted signage required by Illinois law with the minimum sales age of 21 for tobacco products, tobacco accessories and related products.
- * Requires tobacco and e-cigarette retailers to update age verification training programs for employees.
- * Specifies age verification requirements for retailers, requiring a person who appears to be under the age of 30 to show government-issued photo identification.

Did You Know?

... you can obtain a free "No Solicitors Invited" sticker to place near your front door at the Village Hall main office.

Bartlett Police Department has noticed an increase in solicitor complaints during the past few weeks. Solicitor laws have changed in recent years, allowing solicitors to go door-to-door unless they approach a residence with a "No Solicitors Invited" sticker. These stickers constitute sufficient notice to prohibit door-to-door solicitation activities.

Individuals associated with religious or political activities are not considered solicitors per the Village of Bartlett solicitor ordinance and United States Supreme Court. However, residents may ask these individuals to leave their property and possibly have them cited or charged with criminal trespass to real property if they refuse to depart when requested to do so.

50/50 Parkway Tree Replacement Program

Through its long-running Parkway Tree Program, the Village of Bartlett has planted trees with the help of homeowners in an effort to reforest and diversify Bartlett's parkways. This 50/50 shared program provides the opportunity for residents to select and purchase a parkway tree, with the Village sharing in 50 percent of the cost.



All trees available for order are two inches in diameter. The cost for residents per tree is \$100, which includes planting, mulching and a one year warranty. Limited quantities of each species are available, and all orders are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis. Due to the need for tree diversification in the Village, there will be no maple species planted this year.

You are only eligible to purchase a tree if you had a tree removed from your parkway or have the space for one to be planted. Planting is only done in the parkway, not on private property. Trees must be spaced 30 to 40 feet apart. Other restrictions, such as proximity to driveways, street lights, hydrants, storm sewers, etc. may occur. Final planting locations will be determined by the Village.

Public Works will begin taking orders on August 19 for the fall 2019 planting season. Visit the Public Works page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us, on or after August 19 to see the available tree species, photos, and order form. Orders, with checks made payable to the Village of Bartlett, must be received by September 30. 
FREE World War I Walk -- 10 a.m. OR 2 p.m. A century ago, in 1919, Bartlett welcomed home its WW I soldiers with a parade, ballgame and more. Learn about the community's 19 Yanks and its homefront efforts during the Great War. Walk with museum staff through the heart of old Bartlett to see where some of the soldiers worked and lived and learn about the Village's support and fundraising endeavors. The walk will last about one hour. Wear comfortable shoes! Meet at the Bartlett Depot Museum 15 minutes prior to tour time.

Will You Be Awarded the Mayor's Medallion?

The annual Passport to Adventure program is now year-long. However in Bartlett, the top site-going family(ies) will still be recognized with the Mayor's Medallion for visiting the most sites from May 2019 through August 2019.

The Bartlett Lions are proud to present the annual 5K/10K and Kids & Family Dash. Previously known as the Bartlett Lions Labor Day Dash, the Lions Dash has become a community tradition.

This year the Lions Dash will be held inside James "Pate" Phillip State Park, 2050 West Stearns Road, Bartlett. Registration fees for the 10K run and the 5K run/walk is \$25 through 8/24; the fee for the Kids & Family Dash (100-yard dash, non-competitive and recommended for kids 5 and younger) is \$10.
