# Caring for Bartlett's Tree Population

With the help of an Urban and Community Forestry Grant through The Morton Arboretum and U.S. Forest Service, the Village earlier this year awarded Graf Natural Resources Management & GIS a contract to conduct a comprehensive inventory of all municipally managed trees within Bartlett, which included all parkway and right-of-way (ROW) trees.

For every tree in the survey, the following information was collected: tree status, address and relative location, species, DBH (diameter at breast height), crown height and spread, parkway width, condition rating (1-5, 1 is excellent, 5 is very poor), roots, wounds, deadwood and rot evaluations, and maintenance recommendation.

The inventory determined there are a total of 15,282 parkway trees in Bartlett with 2,993 available spaces where trees could be planted. The average condition rating of all trees is 2.97, which is slightly above average.

Due to the massive amount of tree removals and replacements following the emerald ash borer infestation, the age of Bartlett's tree population is now relatively young. It is estimated that 33.2% are less than 15 years old and 33.3% are about 20 to 25 years old. That means only a third of the total population is considered to be "mature."

The ultimate goal is to have a fairly equal

number of trees in each age classification. Therefore, it is important for the Village to prioritize the planting, health and maintenance of young trees so the population becomes more balanced and mature in the future.


There are a total of 117 different species throughout the Village. While this is a respectable number, there is still work that needs to be done to increase the diversity of the population. Urban Forestry has adopted the "20-10-5" rule as best practice, which states that a tree population should ideally have no more than 20% of any single family, no more than 10% of any single genus and no more than 5% of any single species.

In Bartlett, maples currently make up 32.8% of the population, followed by honeylocusts at 22.2% and lindens at 11.9%. In the future, the Village will moderate new plantings of these three genera and improve diversity by offering underrepresented species as part of its Parkway Tree Replacement Program.

With all of this valuable information, Bartlett's Public Works Department is now better equipped to address any concerns and plan for the future by creating a long-term management strategy that will keep the community's urban forest healthy, beautiful, safe and stable for years to come.

# *Timeout with the Trustees*

Coming to Brewster Creek Business Park -- McKesson Medical-Surgical Inc. Coming to the Village's downtown -- Streets of Bartlett. Both of these prominent projects, one industrial and one commercial, started more than a year ago with cautiously optimistic talks and now are well on-track to grand openings in Bartlett.

In August, the Village Board approved the final piece of an incentive package that will bring the \$40 million-plus McKesson Medical-Surgical Inc. (MMS) development project to the Brewster Creek Business Park. A division of McKesson Corporation, which is currently ranked 7th on the Fortune 500, MMS is a distributor of medical supplies, durable medical equipment, surgical supplies and medical lab supplies.

The 400,000 square foot building planned for a 26.3-acre site in the business park will serve as a regional warehouse, distribution and office facility for the company. It is projected that MMS will employ 200 workers by 2024 at this distribution center, the majority of them full-time. This will be the first industrial project in the Cook County portion of Brewster Creek Business Park.

The former Bartlett Fresh Market in Bartlett Plaza at Devon and Main Street has been vacant since fall of 2010, and the shopping plaza itself had been on the market for several years.

The 31,860 square foot Bartlett Fresh Market space required numerous improvements to bring it up to current building codes. In addition the entire shopping center suffered from long delayed maintenance and required extensive renovation if it hoped to attract new businesses.

In late spring, R. Group Properties & Management closed on the purchase of Bartlett Plaza and quickly embarked on a \$2 million redevelopment of the shopping center, which has been renamed Streets of Bartlett. Renovations include improvements to the

building facades, roof, parking lot, shopping center lighting, signage and correction of all code-related issues. The new owner also began working on interior buildouts in order to sign new tenants and reduce the center's high vacancy rate.



The buildup for Armanetti Beverage Mart in a portion of the old Fresh Market is at or near completion. In addition, buildouts are underway for new restaurant One Taco Dos Tequilas and relocation of D'Licious Crepes & Roti from the Town Center to Streets of Bartlett. Another newly signed tenant is ice cream shop Cherry on Top.

The Village looks forward to welcoming McKesson to Brewster Creek Business Park and Streets of Bartlett to the downtown. We are excited about the significant investments these businesses are making in the community and are especially pleased that Bartlett's economic development continues to head in such a positive direction.

# POLICE BEAT

## Police Join Neighbors by Ring App

Bartlett Police Department recently joined the Neighbors by Ring app to help residents get real-time crime notifications directly to their smartphones and make the community safer. It also will allow police to see posts that residents voluntarily share on the Neighbors app, an app launched by Ring, Amazon's smart-doorbell company.

This new crime reduction strategy has been instrumental in catching package thieves, deterring criminal activity and keeping neighborhoods safe in other communities. By using this app, Bartlett Police does not have access to your Ring doorbell or security camera devices. Residents are in complete control of their devices and can decide whether they want to share any video footage or other information with the police department.

Residents can text 'bartlettil' to 555888 to download the free Neighbors by Ring app on their iOS or Android smartphones or other electronic devices. The app is available to download and use even if residents do not own a Ring doorbell or security camera.

The Neighbors by Ring app is not a primary reporting tool nor is it monitored by Bartlett Police 24/7. It is important that you continue to call 9-1-1 for emergencies, to request police assistance or to report criminal activity.

## Department Purchases Unmanned Aircraft System

The Police Department recently purchased a DJI Matrice 210 and a DJI Mavic Pro small unmanned aircraft system (sUAS) to enhance its mission of protecting lives and property when other means and resources are not available or are less effective. This

purchase was fully funded by seized drug asset forfeiture funds and did not use any taxpayer dollars.

The DJI Matrice 210 is a state-of-the art sUAS equipped with infrared and thermal camera technology and a high definition 30x optical zoom camera. The DJI Mavic Pro is smaller and is equipped with a high definition camera that will allow police to quickly deploy it outdoors or in close quarters



Bartlett's sUAS program consists of a program coordinator, team supervisor and several other individuals who successfully completed a weeklong training to obtain their Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Remote Pilot Certificate. This certificate is required under FAA rules and certifies their understanding of the regulations, operating requirements and procedures for safely flying a sUAS.

Bartlett Police will strictly adhere to privacy law, such as the Illinois Freedom from Drone Surveillance Act and the safety operating procedures established by the FAA when deploying sUAS equipment.

## Help Monitor RR Stoppages

Canadian Pacific (CP) and Wisconsin Central, Ltd. (CN) have reached an interim agreement under which the railroads' interchange operations have been moved out of Bartlett for the time being, pending a final ruling by the Surface Transportation Board (STB).

This measure will greatly reduce the stoppages and traffic delays at the West Bartlett Road, Stearns Road and Spaulding Road crossings that directly resulted from the railroads exchanging freight cars at the Spaulding Road interchange. According to the agreement, CN will continue to maintain tracks at the interchange and will not remove any tracks before the final STB decision.

The Village of Bartlett is asking for the public's help in monitoring stoppages. **If you experience a prolonged stop or blockage at one of the three crossings mentioned, please call the Village at 224-236-6296.** Routine train traffic will continue to travel through Bartlett; please do not report traffic delays due to long or slow-moving freight trains.

# Halloween Trick-or-Treat

Bartlett has set Halloween trick-or-treat hours for 3 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, 10/31. Please remember to turn on your porch light if you will be passing out Halloween candy.

The Bartlett Police Department encourages parents to accompany children or have them go out with a large group of friends and to stay in their immediate neighborhoods. It also is a good idea for children to carry glow sticks or flashlights when trick-or-treating during the evening hours and only go to homes where the porch light is on.

Trick-or-treaters should always walk on the sidewalk. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic. Motorists are reminded to drive carefully and watch out for children crossing the roadways.

Costumes are a fun part of this holiday but only if worn safely. Costumes should be simple, flame resistant and, if possible, light-colored. Reflective tape can be added for extra visibility. Plan to use non-allergenic makeup instead of masks, and keep wigs and hats well off the face. Finally, children are reminded to bring their Halloween candy home and to have an adult examine all treats before eating.

The Village of Bartlett will be hosting its fourth annual pumpkin composting event with this year's Pumpkin Smash. SCARCE, a nonprofit organization committed to keeping "stuff" out of the landfill by reusing or recycling, first brought this event to DuPage County in 2014 and has since diverted more than 254 tons of pumpkins from landfills.

Residents can bring their pumpkins and jack-o'-lanterns for composting in order to return nutrients back to the soil and lower methane gas production in landfills. Regular or decorated pumpkins are allowed, but please remove yarn, stickers or any plastic items before composting.

# Free Leaf Collection



For the health and safety of Bartlett residents, leaf burning has been prohibited in the Village since 1991. To help with the abundance of leaves each autumn, Bartlett's contract with Groot Industries provides for leaf collection at no additional cost to residents during October and November.

Leaves should be placed in brown paper yard bags at the curb each Tuesday alongside other household refuse and recyclables. DO NOT put leaves in plastic bags; these will not be collected. You DO NOT need to buy Groot yard waste

stickers for leaves. Generic yard waste bags without stickers are accepted. However, all other yard waste, such as grass clippings, pulled weeds, etc., must still be placed in stickered yard bags for collection.

Branches/brush must be bundled in 2 foot by 2 foot by 4 foot long bundles and is collected weekly through November.

Village ordinance prohibits any person from depositing, raking, shoveling, plowing, blowing or dumping any leaves, grass clippings, branches or snow, onto any public parkway, gutter or street. Excess leaves and lawn clippings can obstruct sewers and cause flooding. Large piles of leaves also can freeze once temperatures drop and become roadway hazards.


## Did You Know?

...the Village has adopted a new policy for dealing with damaged mailboxes during snowstorms.

Occasionally, heavy snows knock over or cause damage to residents' mailboxes. With snow season fast approaching, the Bartlett Public Works Department has begun planning for snow removal.

In accordance with its new policy, the Public Works Department, in the upcoming weeks, will survey the snow plow routes and make note of any weak posts or already damaged mailboxes. Residents will be informed prior to any snow event if they have a mailbox that required a repair to withstand heavy snowfall and snow plow movements through their neighborhoods.
