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

New Recreational Cannabis Law

Beginning on January 1, 2020, adults 21 years of age or older can legally possess, consume and purchase certain amounts of recreational cannabis with a few exceptions. Bartlett Police Department reminds residents that the only lawful place to consume recreational cannabis is inside your private residence or on your personal private property outside of public view. Here are some important highlights of the new recreational cannabis law:

- You must be 21 years old or older to purchase, possess or use cannabis except where authorized by the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Act or the Community College Cannabis Vocational Pilot Program.
- An Illinois resident who is 21 years of age or older will be able to lawfully possess 30 grams of cannabis flower, no more than 500 milligrams of THC contained in cannabis-infused products and 5 grams of cannabis concentrate.
- It is illegal to operate, navigate or be in actual physical control of any motor vehicle, aircraft, watercraft, or snowmobile while using or under the influence of cannabis.
- It is illegal to transport cannabis in a vehicle unless the cannabis is in a reasonably secured, sealed container and it is reasonably inaccessible while the vehicle is moving. It is also illegal to use cannabis in any motor vehicle.
- The use of cannabis is prohibited in a school bus, on the grounds of any preschool, primary or secondary school, in a private residence that is used at any time to provide licensed child care or other similar social service care on the premises or in any public place, including bars, restaurants, parks and any place where you could reasonably be expected to be observed by others.
- The possession of cannabis is prohibited in a school bus, on the grounds of any preschool, primary or secondary school, or in a private residence that is used at any time to provide licensed child care or other similar social service care on the premises.
- It is illegal to knowingly use cannabis in close physical proximity to anyone younger than 21 years of age who is not a registered medical cannabis patient under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Pilot Program Act.

- It is illegal to smoke cannabis anyplace where cannabis is prohibited under the Smoke Free Illinois Act.
- It is illegal to facilitate the use of cannabis by any person who is not allowed to use cannabis under the Illinois Cannabis Tax & Regulation Act
- It is illegal to transfer cannabis to any person contrary to the Illinois Cannabis Tax & Regulation Act
- Only licensed recreational dispensaries will be allowed to sell recreational cannabis products.

Bartlett Police also reminds residents to be respectful of their neighbors while using recreational cannabis. Please contact the police department at 630-837-0846 if you have any further questions about the new recreational cannabis law.

Timeout with the Trustees

At the 12/17 Village Board meeting, the 2020-2024 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) was approved and staff was authorized to begin engineering and design work on those projects included in the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

Bartlett's Capital Improvements Program is a valuable tool that allows the Village to take a longrange view of its infrastructure and facility needs and to plan for and provide appropriate financing for necessary projects.


The Village Board reviews the five-year program each fall. This allows time to incorporate the new year projects into the upcoming budget development process. Early review also allows more time to bid construction projects, helping to keep costs down and completion timely.

The five-year CIP program for 2020-2024 totals \$98,404,079. This is a 26% decrease from last year's program. Overall, the CIP budget for the next five years shows 47% of funding allocated for sewer projects, 18% each for water and streets projects and the remaining 17% divided between economic development, golf and other projects, as shown on the pie chart.

Aside project expenses for the fiscal year 2020-21, which are firmly set, any project slated for the four years following still need to be voted on by the board every fall.

This year, alongside the full five-year Capital Improvements Program Budget, which you can see on the Village website under the Finance Department, www.village.bartlett.il.us/government/finance-department/budgets, Village IT/GIS staff have unrolled a new interactive CIP Budget map.

This app was created to help residents understand the CIP better. It is full of charts and maps that are fully interactive so you can click to see the various projects planned for the Village.



Highlighted in the new app is the capital budget for fiscal year 2020-2021, which is \$15.7 million. It is organized into the six project categories -- water; sewer; street; economic development; golf; and other projects -- each with its own tab and clickable links that allow you to zone in and view pop-ups with additional information on specific projects. You can also expand charts, graphs and even look up your address to see what is happening on your own block.

We hope you enjoy this new, immersive way to view the CIP budget. We also encourage you to visit the Village website regularly to view all of the information available for you. We value resident input and extend an invitation to you to attend Village Board meetings that are regularly scheduled on the first and third Tuesdays every month at 7 p.m.













Flood

FLOOD HAZARD AREAS

The Village of Bartlett has some floodplain areas. On the northwest side of town is the Brewster Creek Tributary. In the middle of town there is some floodplain in the Wayne Grove Forest Preserve. The northeastern part of the Village has the Brewster Creek floodplain, which flows to the West Branch of the DuPage River floodplain.

NATURAL & BENEFICIAL FUNCTIONS

Floodplains play a valuable role in providing natural benefits to the Village of Bartlett and the surrounding area. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide open spaces and aesthetic pleasure, as well as function for active processes, such as filtering nutrients.

Wayne Grove Forest Preserve and Hawk Hollow Forest Preserve floodplains are used to filter farm chemical run-off so that these areas can maintain biodiversity and ecosystem sustainability. Both floodplains contain historic and archaeological sites that provide opportunity for education. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/breeding grounds. And lastly, both floodplains provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not occur.

FLASH FLOODS

Flash-flooding is the general type of flooding caused by heavy rain events. A flooding event can occur with 2 to 4 inches of rain in a 3 to 4 hour time period on some streets throughout the Village.

Several detention areas may rise during these events. However, all of the Village streets are designed to additionally store stormwater for a period of time.

During spring and early summer, the Village can experience heavy rain events. It is not uncommon for water to stand in backyard/sideyard drainage areas for up to 48 hours. The Village has made several drainage improvements in problem areas in the last few years and is continually making improvements throughout the community.

DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

As simple as it may sound, keeping smaller ditches and streams free of debris can dramatically improve the run-off capacity of low-lying areas and can greatly reduce the occurrence of blockage that significantly contributes to flooding.

It is illegal to dump materials into a required waterway and violators may be fined. If you see someone in the act of dumping or see debris in one of Bartlett's watercourses, please contact the Village Public Works Department at 630-837-0811.

Homeowners are responsible for maintaining their perimeter drainage swales. You may have a storm inlet in your yard; if you do, make sure to keep it clear of debris. If you have any flooding or drainage concerns on your property, the Village of Bartlett staff is available to assess your drainage issue. You can report a concern by accessing

the GORequest system using the "Contact Us" button on the homepage of the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us or use the "How Do I" drop down navigation tab on the website and look for "Report a problem or concern." In addition, Bartlett's GORequest app is available on your smartphone or tablet. You also can contact the Building Department at 630-540-5920.

PROPERTY PROTECTION MEASURES

If your property is susceptible to flooding, there are many flood damage reduction measures you can employ.

- Watertight seals can be applied to brick and block walls to protect against low-level flooding.
- Utilities, such as heating and air conditioning systems, water heaters and other major appliances can be elevated to higher floors in the structure or onto raised platforms.
- Temporary measures, such as moving furniture and other valuables to higher floors or sandbagging exterior openings, will also help.
- Elevating or relocating the entire structure may also be a feasible option.

FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

All development within the 100-year floodplain (not just construction of buildings, but filling, excavation, fences, etc.) requires a Village development permit. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area.

receive all the information you need to properly develop in the floodplain. You may report any illegal development activities to the above number as well.

FLOOD INSURANCE

If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your agent. Most homeowner insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. Flood insurance is only available to communities participating in the National Food Insurance Program (NFIP). Because of Bartlett's floodplain management programs, which attempt to protect property owners from multiple flooding hazards, the Village is part of the NFIP. Bartlett residents are able to obtain flood insurance. Additionally, because the Village participates in FEMA's CRS program, flood insurance premiums are discounted.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Typical policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking.

There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance. If you are building inside the floodplain and are using a federally regulated lender/bank for a loan, the purchase of flood insurance is mandatory.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT/DAMAGE

If the cost of improvements to a building or the cost to repair damages (from any cause) to a building exceeds 50% of the market value of the building (excluding land value), the NFIP requires that the entire building be brought up to current floodplain management standards. Building improvement projects include exterior and interior remodeling, rehabilitation, additions and repair and reconstruction projects. FLOOD WARNING SYSTEM

Many times, flooding of streets and parking lots can be predicted, allowing ample time for preparation and evacuation. However, in the event of flash flood due to a large rain event, there may only be hours to execute a plan.

Once the Bartlett Police and Bartlett Fire Protection District are notified of an oncoming flood event, the Village's Emergency Alert System will be activated. The Village can send a Code Red or mass emergency notification system alert to the entire Village or a specific neighborhood. Community alerts and additional safety information will also be posted to the Village website.

FLOOD SAFETY TIPS

- Do not drive through a flooded area or around protection barriers. More people drown in cars than anywhere else.
- Do not walk through flowing water. Currents can be deceptive. Six inches of water can knock you off your feet.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocution is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. Turn off the gas to your house before it floods. If you smell gas, report it to the Fire Protection District, the Village or your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains. Flood waters can carry unimaginable items that have dislodged themselves. Culverts can suck in smaller people, making them helpless.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water is contaminated with sewage and other chemicals, which pose severe health threats.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may seek shelter in yours.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbon monoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

50/50 Parkway Tree Replacement Program



Through its long-running Parkway Tree Program, the Village of Bartlett has planted trees with the help of homeowners in an effort to reforest and diversify Bartlett's parkways. This 50/50 shared program provides the opportunity for residents to select and purchase a parkway tree, with the Village sharing in 50 percent of the cost.

All trees available for order are 2 inches in diameter. The cost for residents per tree is \$100, which includes planting, mulching and a one-year warranty. Limited quantities of each species are available, and all orders are filled on a first-come, first served basis.

You are only eligible to purchase a tree if you had a tree removed from your parkway or have the space for one to be planted. Planting is only done in the parkway, not on private property. Trees must be spaced 30 to 40 feet apart. Other restrictions, such as proximity to driveways, street lights, hydrants, storm sewers, etc. may occur. Final planting locations will be determined by the Village.

Public Works will begin taking orders on **February 24, 2020** for the spring planting season. Visit the Public Works page on the Village website, *www.village.bartlett.il.us*, on or after this date to see the available tree species, photos and order form. Orders, with checks made payable to the Village of Bartlett, must be received by April 24, 2020. Did You Know?

...the Decennial Census, also known as the Population and Housing Census, is mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution and takes place every 10 years. Here are some fast facts about the 2020 Census:


- Not only does the census count people, it has to know where they live so it can provide accurate population numbers for counties, states, municipalities, etc. These numbers are used to draw voting districts and determine your representation in Congress.
- Census data, collected every 10 years, helps communities receive funding from the federal government and determines how those funds are allocated for services, such as Medicare, Medicaid, social security, public transportation and education.
- Communities use census information to plan for public safety and emergency preparedness, to draw school district boundaries and build new schools and to make decisions

about community services.

- Businesses use census data to decide where to put a store, office or factory. These new locations create jobs and support the community's economy.
- Real estate developers use census data to decide where to build new homes and revitalize neighborhoods.

The 2020 Census will begin in March and will use a new design that incorporates online and phone response options in addition to the traditional paper option. The online response option allows people to respond on their desktop computers, laptops, smartphones, or tablets.

A Decade at the Depot!

This year the Bartlett Depot Museum, 100 W. Railroad Avenue, is celebrating its 10th birthday. The museum reopened for the 2020 season on February 1 with two new exhibits:

"Ticket to Ride: Mark Llanuza's Photos to Metra Monthly Passes"

Mark Llanuza, a longtime Bartlett resident and Metra employee, is also a lifelong rail fan. In his youth he began photographing images of trains in the Chicagoland area, including Bartlett. His portfolio caught the attention of Metra, which asked to use his photographs for its corporate publications, to document railroad accidents and more.

In January 2016, Metra began using real images in a portrait format on its monthly passes. Llanuza's work was selected "as the foundation for the new artwork" that inaugural year. His photos continue to be featured and are the focus of this exhibit.



"Next Stop Spaulding! A Community Lost to Time"

Residents, a school and businesses once formed the community of Spaulding at the railroad junction of the former Elgin, Joliet and Eastern Railway (today the Canadian National Railway Co.) and the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad (today Metra). 
