

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Halloween 2020



Trick-or-Treating

Like so many holidays that have changed because of the coronavirus pandemic, you can expect Halloween 2020 to look a bit different as well. Many traditional Halloween activities can be high-risk for spreading viruses. However, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/daily-life-coping/holidays.html, offers some low-risk alternatives that are fun for the kiddos while maintaining the "spirit" of the holiday.

- ~ Carving or decorating pumpkins with members of your household or outside, at a safe distance, with neighbors and friends
- ~ Having a virtual Halloween costume contest
- ~ Having a Halloween movie night with people you live with
- ~ Having a scavenger hunt-style trick-or-treat search with your household members in or around your home rather than going house to house

If you do decide to trick or treat on Halloween (Saturday, 10/31), the Village's hours are traditionally from 3 to 7 p.m. This year, please help prevent the spread of the virus by social distancing, staying in your immediate neighborhood and wearing a face mask at all times. A Well-Trained Police Force

The Bartlett Police Department continually strives to build trust with the public and form positive community relationships. Professionalism and communication are key to achieving this community bond.

Professional development and ongoing training are some of the building blocks employed to help officers adhere to the high standards the department has set for itself.

In 2019, members of the department attended 14,441 hours of training. Ongoing instruction includes important topics, such as de-escalation, crisis intervention, mental health awareness, implicit bias and cultural diversity.

Recently, Detective Christopher Johnson and Officer Jouwon Tate attended a two-day Fair and Impartial Policing trainer's program to learn about the effects of implicit bias. They were taught tactics on how to reduce and manage biases so officers can be more effective in their day-to-day operations. Johnson and Tate will be responsible for teaching this important topic to all members of the police department.

Bartlett has also contracted with a police training vendor to conduct an eight-hour training block on implicit bias that all department members will attend by the end of October 2020. This course will assist department personnel in overcoming maladaptive bias, using productive bias and improving their verbal and nonverbal communication skills.

In-house training covering mental health awareness and suicide also is scheduled to for 2020. Approximately 81% of Bartlett police officers currently are trained in Crisis Intervention Team (CIT). CIT programs create connections between law enforcement, mental health providers, hospital emergency services and individuals with mental illness and their families. Through collaborative community partnerships and intensive training, CIT improves communication, identifies mental health resources for those in crisis and helps to ensure officer and community safety.



Additionally, the department is planning inhouse instruction on the Police Executive Research Forum's Integrating Communications, Assessment and Tactics (ICAT) training. Essentially, ICAT is a new approach to use-of-force training for American police officers that integrates critical thinking, crisis intervention, communications and tactics. ICAT is anchored by a Critical Decision-Making Model that helps officers assess situations, make safe and effective decisions, and document and learn from their actions.

The goal is to enhance both police safety and public safety by providing more tools, skills, and options for officers handling different types of critical incidents. The training is especially effective for situations in which subjects are acting erratically because of mental illness or behavioral crisis and are unarmed or armed with a weapon other than a firearm.

Bartlett Police Department expects to incorporate ICAT training on an annual basis beginning in late 2020 or early 2021.

The Bartlett Police Department is committed to remaining on the forefront of professional development for its officers and to the pursuit of training programs, techniques, concepts and best practices that will allow police personnel to address current community needs and prepare for future trends in law enforcement.

Although this board remains profoundly saddened by the sudden loss of Dr. Camerer, we warmly welcome Trustee Gandsey to the dais at Village Hall.

Gandsey is a graduate of Northern Illinois University, where she earned both a B.A. in Public Relations and Media Studies and an M.A. in Communication. She has lived in Bartlett for 11 years.

Since 2017, Gandsey has served as an economic development commissioner for Bartlett. She brings more than 15 years of professional experience in leadership strategy, marketing, communications and public relations at both non-profit organizations and private sector companies to her new role.

Not only does Stephanie have an exceptional record of professional accomplishments, she is enthusiastic about using her knowledge and skills to serve and support our community. She will chair the Village Board's Community & Economic Development Committee and we are fully confident that she is the right person for the position.

Gandsey was sworn in at the Tuesday, 8/18 board meeting, and she will serve the remainder of Camerer's term, which expires in 2021.

Almost at the same time that we welcomed our new board member, we said good-bye to Village Trustee Kristina Gabrenya, who resigned her board seat effective 9/16, in order to devote more time to her family and business.

"It has been the highest honor to have had the opportunity to serve this incredible community and its residents. I would like to thank you and each of the board members and staff for your kindness and support and for your unparalleled dedication. This is an



Gabrenya was appointed to the Village Board in May of 2017 to complete the term of her late mother, long-time Village Trustee T.L. Arends. She was re-elected in 2019 to a four-year term, which expires in spring 2023.

Born and raised in Bartlett, Gabrenya earned her doctor of optometry at St. Louis College of Optometry in Missouri and returned to the Village in 2005 to open her professional practice. Bartlett Vision is located on West Bartlett Road.

Her steady leadership and guidance helped the Village successfully navigate many economic development and modern-day challenges during the past two years.

Free Leaf Collection

For the health and safety of Bartlett residents, leaf burning has been prohibited in the Village since 1991. To help with the abundance of leaves each autumn, Bartlett's contract with Groot Industries provides for leaf collection at no additional cost to residents during October and November.

Leaves should be placed in brown paper yard bags at the curb each Tuesday alongside other household refuse and recyclables. DO NOT put leaves in plastic bags; these will not be collected. You DO NOT need to buy Groot yard waste stickers for leaves. Generic yard wast bags without stickers are accepted. However, all other yard waste, such as grass clippings, pulled weeds, etc., must still be placed in stickered yard bags for collection.

Branches/brush must be bundled in 2 foot by 2 foot by 4 foot long bundles and is collected weekly through November.

Village ordinance prohibits any person from depositing, raking, shoveling, plowing, blowing or dumping any leaves, grass clippings, branches or snow, onto any public parkway, gutter or street. Excess leaves and lawn clippings can obstruct sewers and cause flooding. Large piles of leaves also can freeze once temperatures drop and become roadway hazards.


1. Recruit and Organize as many neighbors as possible

2. Contact your local law enforcement agency and schedule a meeting

The next step is contacting your local law

enforcement agency. Invite them to meet with your group at a time and place convenient for your Watch Group.



3. Discuss community concerns and develop an action plan

If law enforcement is unavailable to come to the first meeting, you might want to have a meeting to discuss the concerns and issues in the neighborhood. Your group should create a plan on how to work towards lessening the impact of the top three concerns of neighbors.

4. Create a communication plan

It is important to decide what type of communication will work for your Watch Group - meetings or social media or both.

5. Take Action: Hold Meetings and Events

Neighborhood Watch Toolkit has a number of wonderful training topics and meeting ideas that can be useful to your group.



Did You Know?

...the Village now offers paperless utility billing. You can sign up to receive your Bartlett water-sewer bill by email and help reduce the impact of paper billing on the environment. You will need a couple of pieces of information from an existing bill to fill out the online form, including your account number and your customer number.

Don't Feed Wildlife!

Although people who feed wildlife view it as a positive experience, wildlife biologists discourage the practice because it has a negative impact on the wildlife and the community.

- 1. Feeding wildlife increases the risk of injury and/or disease transmission to humans and their household pets.
- 2. Urban wildlife congregates in numbers larger than they would under natural conditions, increasing the spread of diseases between animals.
- 3. When wildlife is fed regularly, they become less wary of people. This can cause them to become nuisances and damage property.
- 4. It is illegal in Illinois to feed deer or lure deer to come to the property to eat what has been set out for other animals. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) will enforce this law and impose fines.

Bartlett allows a maximum of four bird-feeders to be hung from trees, a minimum of 4 feet from the ground and filled with birdseed specifically intended for birds. Bird-feeders must be cleaned at regular intervals to reduce the spread of disease.

Plant trees, shrubs and flowers that provide natural food sources, cover and nesting sites for birds. This reduces the likelihood of healthy birds coming into contact with sick birds and other animals.

Make sure bird-feeders are equipped with devices to discourage squirrels from feeding. Clean up seeds that fall to the ground to prevent attracting rodents, opossums, raccoons, squirrels, skunks, etc.

If you feed your pets outdoors, remove the bowls and clean up any spilled food. **NEVER** place food scraps outside and store garbage properly in solid trash containers with secure lids.

If animals have become a nuisance, contact a licensed wildlife trapper to remove the animal from your property. To do it yourself, you need a permit; contact IDNR at James Pate Phillip State Park, 847-608-3100. **POISONING OF WILDLIFE IS STRICTLY PROHIBITED**.

Seasonal Code Enforcement Reminders

- * All summer recreational vehicles, boats and trailers must be off driveways by November 1 and cannot be returned to driveways until May 1.
- * Snowmobiles and trailers may be parked on driveways starting November 15 until April 15.
- * Holiday lighting and displays are permitted on private property for a period NOT TO EXCEED 90 days.

Mailbox Reimbursement Policy



Fall is just getting started, but the Bartlett Public Works Department is one step ahead, already planning for snow removal.

Occasionally, heavy snows knock over or cause damage to residents' mailboxes. The Village policy for reimbursement of damaged mailboxes during snowstorms is only applicable to those mailboxes that are built to U.S. Postal Service specifications and requirements and hit directly by a Village snowplow.

During the upcoming months, PW staff will survey their snowplow routes and make note of any weak posts or already damaged mailboxes. Residents will be informed if they have a mailbox that requires a repair to withstand a heavy snowfall and snowplowing in their neighborhoods.
