# COVID-19 Holiday Safety Tips

The holidays bring opportunities to celebrate traditions and meaningful moments with the special people in your life. This year as you prepare for December holidays, such as Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa and New Year's Eve, these safety tips from the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) can help protect you, your family, friends and your community from COVID-19.

## Travel Considerations

If traveling this holiday season, consider the mode of transportation (plane, car, bus, train), the dates you will be traveling and your risk to COVID-19



exposure while traveling. Carry a small personal sanitizing kit that contains hand sanitizer, disinfecting wipes and extra masks. Driving your own vehicle will reduce your exposure to COVID-19. If you need to

use commercial or public transportation, try to avoid the busiest travel times. Also, reconsider travel during the holiday season and consider holding special remote gatherings or small gatherings at home.

## Overnight Guests

If you plan to be or host overnight guests, make sure everyone communicates what is expected ahead of time. Make sure everyone understands the importance of wearing a mask and social distancing. Ensure that soap and sanitizer are readily available and clean frequently touched surfaces regularly. Identify a room where an individual can isolate should they develop symptoms or test positive while visiting.

## Holiday Shopping

When possible, consider alternative ways to purchase gifts other than visiting stores in person.

**Lower Risk:** shopping online


**Medium Risk:** if you choose to shop in-person, wear

your mask and maintain 6 feet of distance between you and others. Try to shop at off-peak times, when there are fewer shoppers.

**Higher Risk:** shopping at in-person sale promotions and holiday activities that encourage large crowds and lining up for limited supply deals. These events make social distancing a challenge.

## Holiday Meals

- Avoid the crowds of people shopping for holiday meals by ordering groceries online.
- Limit the number of people so social distancing is possible before, during and after the meal. Space small seating areas at least 6 feet apart.
- Consider single-use disposable utensils and dishware for serving and eating meals.
- Wash and disinfect guest areas before and after holiday gatherings.
- Delivering holiday foods and dessert at the door of extended family, elders, friends and/or neighbors is another warm and safer way to celebrate a season of giving.



## Did You Know?

... the Illinois Department of Human Services' Mental Health Division offers a FREE emotional support text line, Call4Calm, for Illinois residents experiencing stress and mental health issues related to COVID-19. Individuals who would like to speak with a mental health professional can text "TALK" to 5-5-2-0-2-0, or for Spanish, "HABLAR" to the same number: 5-5-2-0-2-0. Individuals will remain anonymous. Within 24 hours of sending a text, they will receive a call from a counselor from a local community mental health center to provide support.



# *A Minute with the Mayor*

The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a devastating toll on hundreds of millions of people across the globe. Not only our physical and mental health but our economic well-being has been put to a hard test by this new virus.

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act was passed by Congress with bipartisan support and signed into law on March 27. This \$2 trillion-plus economic relief package provided fast and direct economic assistance for American workers and families, small businesses and preserved jobs for American industries.

Additionally, the pandemic response has stressed all government budgets, including those of smaller municipalities, such as Bartlett, that provide vital day-to-day services to our residents and local businesses.

Under the Act, units of local government with a population exceeding 500,000 were eligible to receive this funding and were then able to distribute funds to municipalities below this population threshold for direct expenses related to coronavirus. The money could only be used for pandemic-related costs incurred from March 1 to December 30 of this year and was not available to offset lost revenue due to the coronavirus.

DuPage County received more than \$161 million in federal funds through the CARES Act. The DuPage County Board established the Local Government Municipal COVID-19 Reimbursement Program to provide a portion of these federal funds to assist DuPage cities, towns and villages, recognizing the increased expenses all local governments have incurred as they continue to serve and protect their communities.

Bartlett was allocated a cap of \$1,268,732.16 and received a check for the full amount from DuPage County in October. The Village was required to submit eligible expenses that were incurred due to the COVID-19 public health response. Bartlett's COVID-19-related expenses included personal protection equipment (PPE) and items necessary to

meet social distancing requirements; sanitation and disinfectant products for sanitizing village hall, other public buildings and emergency vehicles; technology software/equipment necessary to hold board meetings online; additional payroll costs for employees dedicated to mitigating the spread of or responding to COVID-19; and many other costs.

Cook County received approximately \$429 million from the U.S. Treasury from the CARES Act and chose to allocate \$51 million of this relief among the municipalities located within Cook County.

Allocations to each municipality were determined through an equitable lens, with factors that included, but were not limited to the following: immediate needs of the municipality to respond to the pandemic, municipal population, municipal median income and municipal public health statistics.

Bartlett initially was allocated \$144,006.86 in relief funds through Cook County and received a check for the entire amount. The Village was then allowed to request an additional \$12,000 of Coronavirus Relief Funds that went unclaimed by other Cook County jurisdictions.

Finally, the Village requested \$29,034.91 in funding from FEMA for purchased COVID-19 related materials. At press time for the Bartletter, this application was still under review by FEMA. If approved, FEMA will reimburse the Village 75% of its cost for purchases.

We have not yet fully scaled the obstacles that this pandemic has placed in our path. However, recent positive news regarding a promised vaccine offers renewed hope for a better 2021.

During this holiday season, may you find peace and calm, goodness and joy, and may the love of family and friends sustain you into a lighter and brighter New Year.

## Prescription Drug Drop-Off 1/30/2021

Residents can drop off items inside Village Hall, 228 S. Main Street, from 9 a.m. to noon. Medications accepted in the program include non-controlled prescription and OTC drugs, liquid medication in leak-proof containers, pet medications, vitamins, ointments, lotions, homeopathic remedies and suppositories. No needles/sharps accepted! Proof of residency is not required. Please wear a face covering inside Village Hall.

- Install security cameras.

# Be a Hydrant Hero - Volunteer to Keep It Clear

Last year, the Village of Bartlett and Bartlett Fire Protection District launched a new safety program and they continue to need your help! In the winter months heavy snowfall often buries fire hydrants, making it difficult for firefighters to locate and access them during an emergency, when every second counts! The Village and Fire Protection District is asking residents and other community members to sign up and adopt a hydrant to help keep Bartlett safe.

## Participation in the Adopt-A-Hydrant program involves:

- ~ making sure the adopted fire hydrant is clearly visible from the street
- ~ keeping the fire hydrant free of snow and ice with clearances of at least three (3) feet all around the hydrant.
- ~ keeping the hydrant free of grass, weeds and debris with clearances of at least three (3) feet all around the hydrant.

## How to Adopt

1. Visit the Village website, [www.village.bartlett.il.us](http://www.village.bartlett.il.us), and find the Adopt-a-Hydrant webpage link under the "Services" navigation tab on the homepage.
2. You will be asked to enter an email address into the sign-up field and then fill in your name, etc.
3. Once signed up, you will receive a login link via email. Click the link to access the Adopt-a-Hydrant interactive map.
4. Next, select a hydrant close to your home or business for convenience. If you like, you can name your hydrant. Have fun with this, but please be appropriate and respectful!
5. After you name your hydrant, hit the "adopt" button.

Throughout your participation in the program, adopters are encouraged to use the Adopt-A-Hydrant application (map) to submit a photo of your hydrant, report an issue with your hydrant and report whenever you have cleared your hydrant after a snowfall. If you decide you no longer want to participate in the program, simply sign in to the application and select "abandon hydrant."



## When shoveling a fire hydrant, remember the “3 rules for 3 feet”:

- 1. Access:** When the fire district uses a hydrant, the “hydrant person” grabs the bag with tools, adapters and a large supply hose that will get the water to the pumper. Having clear access to the hydrant reduces the time spent locating a buried hydrant or digging to get enough room to work.
- 2. Room to Work:** When attaching adapters and “charging” or turning on the hydrant, tools have a tendency to fall and/or get lost in the snow. Three feet of clearance in all directions provides sufficient room for the firefighter to connect to the hydrant without losing equipment in the snow.
- 3. Safety:** You may ask, “Why do I need to shovel the back of the hydrant?” When “charging” or turning on the hydrant, for safety reasons, the hydrant person MUST stand behind the hydrant. The hydrant person MUST NEVER stand in front of the hydrant or to the side of the hydrant. If a hydrant cap, coupling or adapter is not securely affixed or becomes damaged, the water pressure could blow the cap, coupling or adapter off, causing injury to the hydrant person. Once again, having complete clearance around the hydrant (front, both sides and BACK) is vital for proper and safe operations.

## Your Safety is Important!

Please ONLY shovel your hydrant if the conditions are safe to do so. You should be sure that you are completely visible and not in danger of being struck by a passing vehicle when working near the roadway. Also be sure that you are physically able to clear the hydrant. You should NEVER put your safety or health in jeopardy when shoveling the hydrants.

# Snow? Plows are Ready!



Freezing temperatures, snow and ice are the winter norm for this area, and Bartlett Public Works salt trucks and snowplows are ready.

Bartlett streets are plowed in the following order: main streets, secondary collector streets, cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets. Priority is given to the most heavily traveled streets. Visit PW - Streets Division on the Village website to see a jurisdictional street map.

Parking on Village streets is prohibited after 2 inches of snow has fallen to allow plows to completely clear the roadways. It is a good idea to wait until after the final pass of the plow to shovel the end of your driveway.

**DO NOT** shovel snow into the street. It violates Village code, can cause ice patches and can potentially result in serious accidents.

The Village clears snow from sidewalks surrounding public buildings and the commuter areas. The Village does not clear neighborhood sidewalks.

**Please be a snow angel and shovel your sidewalk** so school children and pedestrians can walk safely and easily. Please call Public Works, 630-837-0811, if you have any snow removal questions.

## Groot Tree Collection

Groot collects holiday trees at no additional charge on the regular pickup day for a three-week period following Christmas. Place your tree on the curb with your regular garbage and recycling. All ornaments and tinsel must be removed from the tree. **Do not place the tree in a plastic bag.**

Trees that have decorations or that are put out for disposal after this time period will be picked up but not recycled.

As a reminder, Groot's regular weekly waste pickup day is Tuesday. However garbage is not collected on the following holidays: **New Years Day; Memorial Day; Independence Day; Labor Day; Thanksgiving; Christmas.** If one of these holidays falls on a Sunday, Monday, or Tuesday, collection will be on Wednesday during that week only.

## Plowing Metra Lots

Since the start of the pandemic, Metra ridership has decreased significantly, and parking in the Metra lots has also decreased. In order to schedule Public Works crews most efficiently this winter, some Metra lots will go unplowed following a snow event. If you are a Metra commuter who regularly uses adjacent parking, please see the map below to see what areas will be open and what lots will not be plowed following a snowfall this winter.
