BUILDING CODES IN ACTION

Bartlett's building division observes Building Safety Month each May to raise awareness of the building and fire codes that protect both the economic value and the structural integrity of the homes and buildings in the village. These modern building codes, developed by the International Code Council and implemented by the building division through permitting and inspections, also include safeguards for natural disasters, such as snowstorms, tornadoes, wild fires, floods and earthquakes. The theme for the Building Safety Month 2022 campaign is Safety for All: Building Codes in Action.

"Building Safety Month 2022" encourages you to recognize the importance of safe and resilient building construction and to obtain proper permits before you start a home construction project this spring and summer.



May 1-8 Planning for a Safe & **Sustainable Tomorrow**

Energy fuels our lives. Yet, energy use and greenhouse gas emissions can pose financial and environmental challenges for communities.

Building energy codes are key to improving energy efficiency and resiliency in the built environment. These codes contribute to the health, safety and welfare of communities by reducing energy bills, enhancing resilience from natural and man-made hazards, and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Professions within the building safety field vary widely in their specialties, and the industry offers many well-paying career options for today's workforce.

Clean water is the world's most precious commodity. According to World Health Organization estimates, as of June 2019, 785 million people lacked even a basic drinking-water service.

Building, plumbing and green codes help guard potable water for future generations through proper construction, conservation and safe disposal. Code officials are vigilant protectors of the water supply.

A Minute with the Mayor

Every year around this time, village staff updates the Economic Development Commission (EDC) with current economic indicators for our municipality. There is a good deal of positive news in the recent EDC report, so I wanted to share some of it with you.

About seven years ago, Bartlett's economy was struggling with an overall commercial vacancy rate around 20% and a downtown rate of more than 30%. Since then, the country's economy has continued expanding and the village has implemented marketing and incentive strategies, such as the business friendly BEDA grant program, sales tax sharing agreements and state and county property tax incentives, to encourage new development and fill key vacancies.

Despite the challenges from the pandemic, the village's economy has grown.

Industrial: Large institutional investors like Ridge Development, Logistics Property Company and Conor Globe Commercial have been willing to invest \$30 to \$50 million or more on speculative projects with a high level of confidence that they will be able to lease these buildings. This was the case with a newly constructed 436,000 square foot spec building that has now been leased to Colony Display Company.

Also, the completion of the Main Steel building redevelopment on Devon Avenue is expected this spring and the building is preleased to three tenants.

Bartlett's current industrial vacancy rate remains at a virtual all-time low of 3.5%.

Commercial: The retail/commercial sector remains strong with a vacancy rate of just 5%. Most vacancies consist of older buildings requiring significant reinvestment to be brought up to code. Staff has offered BEDA grants and worked with prospects in an effort to fill these.

The village also has entered into several sales tax sharing agreements to attract sales tax producing

uses, such as the Culver's on Route 59 and MORE Brewing, which recently broke ground.

While Bartlett Town Center's vacancy rate has gone up recently, the village is working with multiple prospects and anticipates a higher occupancy



rate at the town center by the close of this year.

Other small spaces in town have largely been filled and include new health drink store Elevate in Streets of Bartlett, new downtown comic book store Geek Inc. in Main Street Plaza and the new Wing Stop restaurant on Route 59.

Jobs: Long known as a bedroom community, Bartlett has worked for decades to build up the daytime population in order to support and attract new business. Per Jobs EQ, total employment in the village was 9,881 in the second quarter of 2021. With the imminent relocation of Colony Display's employees to the village and other projects, it is projected that this number will eclipse 10,000 by next year.

Sales: Overall taxable sales in the village were nearly identical to last year, rising by two percent from \$2,533,479 (July 2019 to June 2020) to \$2,587,520 (July 2020 to June 2021).

This number is expected to grow dramatically in the coming years due to the Bartlett auto mall set for construction on Lake Street.

The Year Ahead: The village board and staff continues to implement marketing and incentive programs to fill remaining vacancies and further develop Bartlett's economy. We hope to continue on this positive track throughout the year and report similar growth in 2023.







April 2002 - Arts in Bartlett

Twenty years ago, about 60 people gathered at Bartlett Public Library to explore the possibility of an arts council in the village. April will mark the 20th anniversary of Arts in Bartlett's incorporation.

Since its start, Arts in Bartlett has been the cultural arts anchor in the community, mounting the village's first ever juried art fair which has evolved into The Global Arts Festival. This year the festival is planned for June 11 & 12 at the Bartlett Park District's Jim Jensen Pavilion on Stearns and South Bartlett Road.

This civic group has also brought us monthly exhibits in the art gallery at Bartlett Village Hall; partnered with the village to help establish Miaoli City as our Sister City in Taiwan; supplemented art education in Bartlett elementary schools; helped bring public art to the downtown; and opened the Bartlett Center for the Arts, 215 S. Main Street, which allows for expanded services to the community in the form of larger gallery space, artist and musician studios, and a spot for networking events and performances.

Thank you Arts in Bartlett for everything you do to fulfill your mission, "to celebrate the arts and personal creativity so that the community and each individual is enriched."

April 1872 - Arbor Day

This April marks a special occasion in the tree planting world -- the 150th anniversary of Arbor Day! While Arbor Day is now celebrated around the globe, it came from very humble beginnings -- the idea of one man from a small town in Nebraska.

Many of us in the Chicago area recognize the name Julius Sterling Morton due to the Morton Arboretum in Lisle, which was established in 1922 by Morton's daughter Joy to continue the family legacy to plant trees.

In 1855 Julius Sterling Morton purchased a large plot of land in Nebraska City, where he settled with his family. As pioneers began moving into the Nebraska Territory, the lack of trees was felt deeply. New residents missed the trees they left behind and were without trees for windbreaks, fuel, building materials and shade.

Morton was passionate about planting trees on his own property and also used his platform as a newspaper editor to spread his knowledge of trees and advocate for their ecological importance and value.

On January 4, 1872, Morton first proposed a tree planting holiday to be called "Arbor Day" at a meeting of the state board of agriculture. The celebration date was set for April 10, 1872 with prizes for those who planted trees correctly. The day was a resounding success, with an estimated one million trees planted in the state.

Within 20 years, Arbor Day was celebrated in every state except Delaware and in 1970 it became recognized nationwide thanks to President Richard Nixon. In the U.S. Arbor Day is celebrated on the last Friday in April (4/29 in 2022). It is marked by the planting of trees and emphasizes caring for them as a way to sustainably protect Earth's natural resources. Morton's words about Arbor Day resonate strongly today, as climate change becomes a growing threat: "Other holidays repose upon the past; Arbor Day proposes for the future."

TREE CITY USA AWARD

Bartlett was recognized recently with the Tree City USA Growth Award. The award is presented by the Arbor Day Foundation to participating Tree City USA communities that demonstrate higher levels of tree care and community engagement. The Growth Award recognizes major milestones and annual activities in five categories that combine to build sustainable community forestry programs over the long term. Planting more trees than were removed and staff members receiving additional arborist credentials qualified Bartlett for the award this past year.



Prescription Drug Drop-Off 4/30!

The Village of Bartlett holds a prescription drug drop-off on the last Saturday of the month. Drop off your expired or unwanted medication inside Bartlett Village Hall, 228 S. Main Street, from 9 a.m. to noon. Medications accepted in the program include non-controlled prescription and OTC drugs, liquid medication in leak-proof containers, pet medications, vitamins, ointments, lotions, homeopathic remedies and suppositories. No needles/sharps accepted! Proof of residency IS NOT required.

Did You Know?

...that since Illinois' graduated driver licensing (GDL) law took effect in January 2008 teen driving deaths have dropped by 51 percent.

Permit Phase for Drivers Age 15

During this phase, teens must be enrolled in an approved driver education course and hold the permit for a minimum of nine months. A minimum of 50 hours driving practice required, including 10 at night, supervised by a licensed parent or adult age 21 or older. Nighttime driving restrictions - Sunday to Thursday, between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.; Friday & Saturday, between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. Passengers limited to one in the front seat and the number of safety belts in the back seat. Cell phone use while driving including a hands free device, is prohibited for drivers younger than 19, except in the case of an emergency.

Initial Licensing Phase for Drivers Age 16-17

A parent/legal guardian must accompany teen to provide written consent to obtain a driver's license, OR complete and notarize an affidavit/consent form. Nighttime restrictions in this phase remain the same. For the first 12 months of licensing or until the driver turns 18, whichever occurs first, the number of passengers is limited to one person under age 20, unless the passenger(s) is a sibling, step-sibling, child or stepchild of the driver. After this, passengers limited to one in the front seat and the number of safety belts in the back seat.

Full Licensing Phase for Drivers Age 18-20

No age-related restrictions apply except in cases where a driver fails to move from the Initial Licensing Phase to the Full Licensing Phase.

Brush & Yard Waste Collection Starts in April

Yard Waste - Yard rakings, grass clippings, small twigs, garden material, such as flowers, vines, weeds, and garden fruit and vegetables are considered yard waste, which is collected by Groot Industries, weekly, April through November, along with your regular garbage and recycling. Residents can use generic yard waste bags with Groot stickers applied. Bartlett Village Hall, Ace Hardware and Jewel carry the yard waste stickers (\$3.50 starting January 1, 2022 through December 2022).

Groot Brush Collection - Groot also will begin its seasonal brush collection in April and will continue brush pickups through November. * the waste hauler collects an unlimited amount of bundled brush, with no

yard waste sticker required; * brush must be bundled in 2-foot by 2-foot by 4-foot long bundles, no heavier than 50 pounds, and must be tied with biodegradable twine, available at the local Home Depot and Ace Hardware; * brush is collected weekly on the same day as your regular garbage/recycling pick-up.

Groot WILL NOT collect your home's brush pile if it is not bundled correctly. The waste hauler will leave a tag detailing the issue. Any brush piles left on the parkway for a period of time may receive written notice from the village. If you have any questions regarding brush or yard waste collection, please contact Groot at 847-429-7370.



Semi-Annual Brush Collection - No Need to Bundle

Beginning in 2021, the Village of Bartlett with contractor Trees "R" Us began providing semi-annual brush pickup in the spring and fall that does NOT require bundling. This is a supplemental program. Groot will still continue to pick up weekly bundled brush, as stated above.

Dates for This Year's Semi-Annual Brush Collection:

Spring Collection - Week 1, June 6 to 10: homes west of S. Bartlett and south of the Metra tracks Week 2, June 13 to 17: ALL homes east of S. Bartlett plus ALL homes north of the Metra tracks

Fall Collection - Week 1, October 3 to 7: homes west of S. Bartlett and south of the Metra tracks Week 2, October 10 to 14: ALL homes east of S. Bartlett plus ALL homes north of the Metra tracks

Place all non-bundled brush in the parkway, cut ends facing street, by 7 a.m. on the Monday morning of your area's assigned week. The pickup for your specific block may not occur until later in the week depending on how many households in each area are using this service. Please DO NOT put brush piles under trees, next to fixtures, mailboxes or power poles, etc.

For residents who want another brush collection option, there is a list of contractors on the village brush collection webpage, www.bartlettil.gov/services/utilities-resident-services/brush-collection, who will collect your brush for a **FEE**.

Hydrant Flushing

It's time for Bartlett Public Works to flush fire hydrants. This process removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly.

Flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Check for discolored water before doing laundry during the scheduled flushing dates below.

Week of 4/4 to 4/8: south of Stearns Road

Week of 4/11 to 4/15 and week of 4/18 to 4/22: north of Stearns Road

The Village of Bartlett is pleased to announce "Pump Up the Art" -- a new program that will allow interested individuals (village residency is not required) to artistically paint fire hydrants within the corporate limits of Bartlett.

The goal of this program is to embrace the talent and creativity of local citizens while displaying new artwork throughout the community. There is no specific theme for this program, though artists are encouraged to incorporate the character of the surrounding environment and neighborhood into their work.

Through online voting, the Village will award first, second, and third place winners for the best hydrant designs. Winning artists will be recognized at a future village board meeting.

There is no cost to apply for the program. Artists are responsible for providing their own materials. Please note that existing hydrant artwork cannot be painted over.



How can I participate in this program?

- Fill out the application/design proposal that can be found at https://maps.vbartlett.org/PumpUpTheArt and follow the instructions
- If you choose to download a paper application, please be sure to include the location of the hydrant you would like to paint and don't forget to fill out the waiver and sign it
- Submit the required application/forms to the Village of Bartlett no later than 4:30 p.m. on June 30, 2022
- You will be contacted once your application has been approved.

How should I begin painting after receiving village approval?

- Remove all dirt, mud and debris from the hydrant before painting
- Protect the immediate area around the hydrant from paint stains
- The use of an oil-based primer before painting will allow paint to better adhere to your hydrant
- Use high quality, oil-based enamel paint for metal
- Painting will be allowed from May 1, 2022 through July 30, 2022

What is prohibited on the hydrants?

- Inappropriate words, advertisements, political messages, etc.
- Glued or attached objects
- Camouflage or designs that significantly reduce hydrant visibility.
- Please avoid using dark colors or a lot of white as they reduce hydrant visibility

Once I have finished painting my hydrant, what should I do?

- Sign the hydrant with your name
- Upload an image of the finished hydrant back on the application link shown above
- Contact the Village of Bartlett, 630-837-0800 or jdienberg@bartlettil.gov, if you have any questions
- Maintain your hydrant's artistic design for up to one year
