Families, join in the fun as the Bartlett Depot Museum brings back the First Saturday Free Children's Craft beginning Saturday, February 3 with a celebration of Lunar New Year.

Columbarium Installed at Bartlett Cemetery



A new columbarium (a structure for the reverential and public storage of funeral urns holding cremated remains of deceased persons) has been installed at Bartlett Cemetery.

There are a total of 80 spots for individual urns, with about 25 percent already purchased. There is also an ossuary in the center of the columbarium, which is a large vault where cremated remains are placed into ossuary felt bags and co-mingled with other cremated remains.

New Exhibit at Village Hall Gallery



On Tuesday, 1/16 at 6:30 p.m., Arts in Bartlett will host an artist reception for the new exhibit at the Bartlett Village Hall 2nd floor gallery.

The exhibit features artist Motika Anand's String Art, also called pin and thread art. Invented by self-taught mathematician Mary Everest Boote in the 19th centry, this is a decorative art form, where nails are driven into a wooden board and thread is strung around the nails to form a delicate and interesting pattern.

Artist Anand learned String Art as a teenager and then picked up the art form and began exploring it in 2020.

The exhibit is open to the public during village hall business hours throughout January and February.

General Information

- Minimize travel.

REMINDERS



In the next few weeks Metra will be changing how it sells its tickets, what kind of tickets it sells and at what price.

Metra is closing its remaining ticket windows and repurposing some of the agents as customer service representatives, including at all of its downtown Chicago stations. Agents at downtown and outlying stations, will stop selling tickets effective February 1. Tickets will be available for purchase through the Ventra app, new ticket vending machines that have already been installed at the busiest stations, and conductors on the trains. (Vending machine installations will continue this year, with the goal of installing them at every station.)



SPRINGFIELD – Beginning January 1, 2024, an update to the Smoke Free Illinois Act no longer permits the use of e-cigarettes in indoor public spaces in Illinois.

The state law signed late last year by Gov. JB Pritzker adds electronic smoking devices to the list of items prohibited for public indoor use under the Smoke Free Illinois Act, the indoor smoking ban that was enacted in 2008. Such devices can no longer be used in indoor public spaces or within 15 feet of a public entrance.

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) supports the intent of the new law, one of several taking effect in the New Year that will improve public health across the state. The changes in fare products and the new prices that take effect February 1 are part of a major restructuring of Metra's fare system that was approved by the Metra Board of Directors in November. The restructuring seeks to simplify Metra's fare structure to appeal to new riders. Fares under the new structure are set at or below pre-pandemic levels.

Under the new structure, the number of fare zones is reduced from 10 to 4, with downtown stations assigned to Zone 1 and outlying stations assigned to Zones 2 through 4 based on a combination of distance from downtown, service patterns and ridership characteristics on each line, which vary.

Also February Monthly Passes will not be available for sale until Feb. 1. The 10-Ride Ticket will no longer be available for purchase after Jan. 31.

Don't Engage." is designed to raise awareness about an increase in road rage incidents leading to violence, as well as educate the public on the signs of road rage and tips on how to prevent and handle these situations. "Although road rage is nothing new, we're seeing people react more aggressively and dangerously," said ISP Director Brendan F. Kelly. "The message is simple – if you see or become part of a road rage situation, don't engage. That extra car length you gain by cutting someone off, or arriving 10 seconds earlier by tailgating another person, is not worth your life."

According to an AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety study, when drivers explained why they became violent, the reasons were often trivial, such as the other driver wouldn't let them pass or they kept tailgating. Almost 80% of drivers reported aggressive behaviors while driving, including speeding and following other vehicles too closely.

Road rage is anger and frustration caused by the stress of driving in a motor vehicle. Some of the most common signs of road rage and aggressive driving are:

- Following too closely or tailgating
- Improper or erratic lane changing
- Illegally driving on the shoulder of the road (emergency lane), in a ditch/median, or on sidewalk
- Passing where prohibited
- Failure to yield right of way
- Failure to obey traffic laws, signs, and devices

• Failure to yield to emergency personnel and construction zone speed limits

- Failure to signal
- Driving too fast for conditions or in excess of posted speed limit or racing
- Making an improper turn

ISP reminds the public that when it comes to aggressive drivers and road rage, don't engage. The following are tips on how to avoid being the victim of road rage:

• If you are in the left lane and someone wants to pass, move to your right and allow them to pass • When merging, make sure you have plenty of room and use your turn signal

• If someone cuts you off, slow down and give them room to merge into your lane

If a speeding driver is tailgating you, safely change lanes when able
Making gestures might anger the other driver; create distance and avoid confrontation

• If another driver is acting angry, don't make eye contact


If you are the victim of road rage or believe a driver is following or harassing you, call 911 and/or go to the nearest police department to report it. Don't lose your temper or your life.

Force Main: Contractor PCE has completed the force main installation up to Stearns Road at Tallgrass Drive. PCE is looking to perform directional drilling from Stearns Road to the Treatment Plant connection point to be treated within the next few weeks.
