

Happy Arbor Day -- April 26!



Did you know that Bartlett has been a Tree City for six years, and in 2022 was recognized with the Tree City USA Growth Award?

To achieve Tree City USA status a community must meet "four core standards of sound urban forestry management." The Tree City USA Growth Award is presented by the Arbor Day Foundation to participating Tree City USA communities that demonstrate higher levels of tree care and community engagement. Planting more trees than were removed and staff members receiving additional arborist credentials qualified Bartlett for the award.

A 2019 municipal tree inventory determined there were a total of 15,282 parkway trees in Bartlett with 2,993 available spaces where trees could be planted. The average condition rating of all trees is 2.97, which is slightly above average.

Due to the massive amount of tree removals and replacements following the emerald ash borer infestation, the age of Bartlett's tree population is relatively young. The tree inventory estimated that 33.2% were less than 15 years old and 33.3% were about 20 to 25 years old. That means only a third of the total population is considered to be "mature."

The ultimate goal is to have a fairly equal number of trees in each age classification. Therefore, it is important for the Village to prioritize the planting, health and maintenance of young trees so the population continues to become more balanced and mature.

This year, in celebration of Arbor Day, you are invited to join the village arborist and Village of Bartlett Museums staff at 10 a.m. on Wednesday, 5/15 for "Breaking Bud, a Tree & History Walking Tour." The walk will begin at the Bartlett Depot Museum, 100 W. Railroad Avenue.

Firearm Restraining Order Awareness
Campaign



Loved one in crisis? A new state education initiative wants you to know that a firearm restraining order gives a person in crisis time to heal.

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), Brady: United Against Gun Violence and the Ad Council are partnering to raise awareness about the lifesaving potential of Firearm Restraining Orders (FROs) or "red flag laws."

Though FROs can be highly effective, a recent study from the Ad Council Research Institute (ACRI) and Joyce Foundation found that only 10% of Illinoisans are familiar with these potentially life-saving tools and know how to use them if needed.

The Illinois effort is the first phase of a planned multi-state campaign called "Pause to Heal." It is designed to prevent firearm suicides and other shootings by educating the public about the state's FRO law, and the power that family and household members have to ask a court to temporarily restrict access to guns and ammunition when a person poses a threat to themselves or others.

Board Approves Fiscal Year 2024/2025 Budget

The Village of Bartlett Board reviewed the proposed fiscal year 2024/2025 budget at the March 5 and March 19 finance committee meetings, and following an April 2 public hearing,



voted to adopt the \$85,610,827 budget.

Total expenditures for all funds decreased more than 20% from last year's budget. This decrease is attributed to the end of the Brewster Creek TIF (tax increment financing) and reduction in the wastewater treatment plant construction costs.

Total revenues also decreased by more than 20%, attributable to fewer loans being required to fund the treatment plant and a smaller property tax increment being received due to the end of the TIF.

The termination of the Brewster Creek TIF has been a significant undertaking. The growth in EAV (equalized assessed value) over the life of the TIF from \$2M in 1999 to nearly \$100M today has made the park an economic engine for the village. Bartlett's daytime population increased to more than 10,000 in the past two years, primarily because of the steady growth of industrial, warehousing, and manufacturing businesses.

Property taxes represent 13% of the entire budget revenues and total \$12,870,519. The village's portion of the total property tax bill is about 10%. The general corporate levy is budgeted to remain the same as the prior year. The prior year's levy increase was to capture added taxable property value from the Brewster Creek TIF closing. Tax rates will not increase as the additional taxable property value will offset the increased levy. This is in line with the village's practice during the past decade.

Increases in the police pension annual contribution will require an evaluation of the pension levy and the possible use of reserve funds in keeping with established policy.

Major infrastructure projects have been reviewed and allocated through the Capital Improvements Plan; this budget includes one year of that five-year plan.

Funding for these projects comes from a variety of sources, including the American Rescue Plan funds, low interest IEPA loans, previous bond issues, and available fund balances. Bartlett is committed to putting these resources to work appropriately and ensuring that the village invests in the community in ways that enhance the quality of life for residents and the conditions that support a successful environment for businesses.

The investment in critical community infrastructure includes the final phase of construction of the wastewater treatment facility, continued replacement of lead water service lines, installation of new more efficient water meters, and the sanitary sewer rehabilitation program - all important to the health and safety of residents.

The budget also includes smaller scale projects, such as new sidewalks and bike paths, and street improvements throughout the community. Additionally the budget includes funding for equipment, operations and training that advances the village's mission and the strategic plan objectives.


The budget continues to be a conservative financial plan intended to hold the line

on expenditures, sustain Bartlett's fiscal stability, and provide for excellence in the delivery of services. The village has taken several steps to ensure its fiscal stability; including, but not limited to department restructuring and introduction of newer technologies to improve efficiencies, and necessary reduction or postponement of expenses. Expenditure patterns were examined to determine where costs could be reduced.

There is much to be proud of in this community and much more to anticipate as the village looks to the future. Yet, there are difficulties to navigate. Diligence and focus on persistent issues such as inflation, a difficult labor market and shortages and price increases for equipment and raw materials will remain a challenge into the fiscal new year

Despite these lingering issues, the steady leadership of the village board and staff continues to safeguard Bartlett's long-established commitment to exceptional service delivery, fiscal prudence and deliberate decision making today to improve the Bartlett of tomorrow.

Texting Option for DuPage Helpline

In addition to dialing or browsing for help, DuPage County residents seeking health and human services can text the county's free 211 information and referral line.

Residents can text their ZIP code to 898211 to connect with a county operator, who can provide referrals to assistance available near them. Texting service will be available between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. In addition to the texting option, residents seeking help can still dial 2-1-1 or visit 211dupage.gov to find services near them 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

"Texting 211 initiates a conversation with a live, specially trained operator who will efficiently connect you to the right resources," said Human Services Chairman Greg Schwarze.

Immediate referrals are available any time of day for services, including clothing or personal items, disaster services, education, food, health and wellness, income support, legal aid, transportation, and more.

211 is a confidential, information and referral service that connects residents to local health and social service resources. It is different from 988, the Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, which provides free and confidential support for people in a mental health, suicidal or emotional crisis.

DuPage County launched 211 in November 2022, and to date, has connected more than 8,000 people to County social services.
