## A Minute with the Mayor

The village has taken the initial steps to adopt a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) district for its Lake Street Corridor, the properties roughly between Lela Lane on the west and Hale Avenue on the east.

Illinois law allows local governments to designate areas within their jurisdiction as TIF districts as a means to invest in infrastructure and other improvements and pay for them by capturing the increase in property taxes generated by the development. TIF encourages new economic development and job creation and allows declining and under performing areas to again become viable. TIF does this without tapping into general revenues or raising taxes.

The village has successfully used TIFs in the past to develop its downtown and the Brewster Creek Business Park. Notably, the equalized assessed value of Brewster Creek Business Park had been around \$2 million in 2000, when the TIF district was starting. It is now approaching \$100 million, indicating nearly \$300 million worth of real estate improvements made. The real estate taxes paid by these thriving businesses will now go directly to the taxing districts for this area, lessening the tax burden on homeowners.

Two newer TIF districts in Bartlett, Bluff City and Route 59 & Lake Street, are also showing signs of good economic promise for Bartlett.


Last June, the village board approved an agreement with Teska Associates Inc. for TIF consulting services related to the creation of a new TIF district along Lake Street. Under the agreement Teska would shepherd the project from initial review and eligibility report through preparation of the project redevelopment plan and TIF adoption.

According to Teska's June 2024 Redevelopment Plan, the businesses along the Lake Street Corridor developed relatively early in the post World War II suburban growth of the Chicago metropolitan area, and they reflect the size, orientation and, in several instances, the obsolescence that characterizes the development of that era. The plan is intended to provide a framework for improvements and reinvestment within the project area over the next 23 years.

The project area contains 13 structures on 28 parcels, totaling approximately 154 acres. The properties include vacant, undeveloped rights-of-way owned and managed by IDOT; commercial vacancies; and deteriorated or dilapidated commercial structures, all of which are opportunities for redevelopment

and public improvements. We believe that turning to this valuable financing tool once again will offer a healthy jumpstart to a needed revitalization in this Bartlett neighborhood.

Along with the TIF redevelopment plan, the



Undertaking improvements and redevelopment within the project area will generate increased tax revenues, create associated commercial/mixeduse opportunities, upgrade public improvements, such as roadways, sidewalks, street lighting, etc., and provide a stimulus for additional development in surrounding areas. Through these improvements, the character and economic viability of the project area, and Bartlett in general, will be improved over time.

On July 18, the village held an initial Joint Review Board meeting to present the Lake Street TIF Plan to the 10 other taxing districts that cover the project area. Another Joint Review Board meeting is scheduled for August 16.

Implementation of the TIF Redevelopment is expected to have significant financial impacts on the taxing districts affected. In the short term, the village's effective use of tax increment financing can be expected to arrest the ongoing decline of existing assessed values in the project area, stabilizing the existing tax base for agencies. In the long term, after the completion of all redevelopment improvements and the payment of all project costs and municipal obligations, the taxing districts will benefit from the increase in equalized assessed valuation and the resulting enhanced tax base.

The board will hold a public hearing concerning the proposed redevelopment project area at its meeting on Tuesday, 8/20. The June 2024 draft of Teska's Lake Street Corridor Redevelopment Plan and Program is available on the village website.





## Semi-Annual Brush Collection - No Need to Bundle

The Village of Bartlett with contractor Trees "R" Us provides semi-annual brush pickup in the spring and fall that does NOT require bundling. This is a supplemental program. Groot continues to pick up weekly bundled brush.

#### **Dates for the Fall Collection:**

Week 1- 9/30 to 10/4: homes west of S. Bartlett and south of the Metra tracks Week 2 – 10/7 to 10/11: ALL homes east of S. Bartlett plus ALL homes north of the Metra tracks

Place non-bundled brush in the parkway by 7 a.m. on the Monday morning of your area's assigned week. The pickup for your specific block may not occur until later in the week depending on how many households in each area are using this service. Please DO NOT put brush piles under trees, next to fixtures, mailboxes or power poles.

Because Trees "R" Us crews use a grappler, it is better if the branches are piled in a large pile and not spread along the parkway. Nothing should be cut shorter than 4 feet or the grappler can't grab it easily. The contractor is also able to take branches that have a larger diameter, as long as it is not a very large log or tree stump.

For residents who want another brush collection option, there is a list of contractors on the village brush collection webpage, www.bartlettil.gov/services/utilities-resident-services/brush-collection, who will collect your brush for a **FEE.** 



## Time to Flush the Hydrants

Hydrant flushing removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly. Flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Check for discolored water before doing laundry.

Public Works will be flushing hydrants starting the last day of September and running through October 18.

## Down at the Depot

Located at 100 W. Railroad Avenue in the village's 1873 depot, the museum highlights Bartlett's rail history through images and objects. The two current exhibits are "Next Stop Spaulding! A Community Lost to Time" and "Ticket to Ride: Mark Llanuza's Photos to Metra's Monthly Passes."

## Bartlett School, Part 4

This year, Bartlett Elementary School is celebrating its 150th year of establishment. The school began in 1874, one year after Bartlett was founded. Initially, it served students in grades 1 through 8 with several grades in one classroom, under one teacher.

On August 13, the 2024-2025 school year will begin with educators, staff and students heading back to the school, today located at 111 E. North Avenue, under the leadership of Principal John Signatur who has been in the position since 2018.

Signatur follows a long line of Bartlett School principals, including Miss Scholl and Miss Brett (1910s), L. N. Vernon (1920s), Tella Mills (1930s), Emil Struckman and Elvina Brandt (1940s), and others. These early principals also served as teachers at the school. Some dealt with issues beyond education. Dallas Puffer Sr. (1903-1972) became principal in 1927 and led the school through its failed bond referendums for a new schoolhouse and the subsequent passage, construction of the new schoolhouse, and finally its move in 1929 from its "condemned" North and Hickory building to its current site.

For some principals, the tenure was brief while others served for years. The longest serving principal

to date has been Robert "Bob" Hardt (1924-2016). A World War II Marine veteran, Hardt came to Bartlett School in 1952, the same year residents voted to join School District U-46.

At that time, the school had 49 students, three staff members and was the only school in the district east of Elgin. Initially, Hardt also served a dual role as principal and educator. During his tenure, three additions were built onto the school and the student population grew to more than 700 children with 35 teachers. Hardt retired in 1986.
