












Begins with the TREE LIGHTING

The 2024 - 2027 Village of Bartlett Strategic Plan was approved by this board at our March 5, 2024 meeting. The plan acts as a road map for the village, with department heads incorporating its vision into day-to-day operations and the budget.

It's important to know that the strategic plan was not formulated solely on board policy, but also was informed by the input of residents who participated in a comprehensive survey during the summer and fall of 2022. In January 2024, department heads analyzed the plan and incorporated additional objectives to align with the plan's goals.

However, developing and adopting the strategic plan is just the beginning of the work. Successful implementation is the end goal, and so to better track our progress, the village has created a dashboard where performance measurements are collected and reported. You can find the interactive dashboard on the village's "Strategic Planning" webpage.

As you can see in the sample image from the dashboard above, the plan is divided into four catego-

ries: short-term routine, short-term complex, long-term routine and long-term complex. In each category, the corresponding strategic plan goals are ennumerated with all objectives and performance measures/indicators listed below.

The objectives are color coded to indicate whether it has been sustained (green), is in progress (blue) or is still to be implemented (purple).

Providing this visual update on our progress implementing the strategic plan helps keep the work on our collective radar, provides all stakeholders with opportunities to provide feedback, and helps promote accountability across all levels of the village.

In addition, regularly monitoring the performance measures reinforces the importance of the strategic plan goals, is essential to keeping plan implementation on track and helps to quickly and easily identify challenges or any necessary changes that need to be made.

We encourage everyone to visit the dashboard and see how the village is doing.









Bartlett has set Halloween trick-or-treat hours for 3 to 7 p.m. on Thursday, 10/31. Please remember to turn on your porch light if you will be passing out Halloween candy. Parents are encouraged to accompany children, to stay in their immediate neighborhoods and only go to homes where the porch light is on.

Trick-or-treaters should always walk on the sidewalk. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic. Drivers are reminded to be extra cautious and watch for kids crossing roads.

Costume Safety: Wear a costume that fits; avoid overly long or baggy costumes to prevent trips and falls. Use reflective tape as a trim for costumes and outerwear to help others see you in lower light. Use non-allergenic makeup instead of masks, and keep wigs and hats well off the face. Wearing a brightly colored costume and carrying a flashlight or glow stick also can help brighten the walk for trick-or-treaters.

Safe Pumpkin Carving: Leave pumpkin carving to the adults. Child helpers can grab a spoon and scoop out the inside or use a marker to trace the design. When your jack-o-lantern masterpiece is ready, use battery-operated lights or glow sticks rather than open-flame candles. If you opt for candles, keep them away from curtains, decorations and other combustibles.

Finally, children are reminded to bring their Halloween candy home and to have an adult examine all treats before eating.

Free Leaf Collection

For the health and safety of residents, leaf burning has been prohibited in Bartlett since 1991. To help with the collection of leaves, the village's contract with Groot Industries provides for leaf collection at no additional cost to residents during October and November.

Leaves should be placed in brown paper yard bags at the curb each Tuesday alongside other household refuse and recyclables. DO NOT put leaves in plastic bags; these will not be collected. You DO NOT need to buy Groot yard waste stickers for leaves. Generic yard wast bags without stickers are accepted. However, all other yard waste, such as grass clippings, pulled weeds, etc., must still be placed in stickered yard bags for collection.

Branches/brush must be bundled in 2 foot by 2 foot by 4 foot long bundles, collected weekly through November.

Village ordinance prohibits depositing, raking, shoveling, plowing, blowing or dumping leaves, grass clippings, branches or snow, onto any public parkway, gutter or street. Leaves and lawn clippings can obstruct sewers and cause flooding. Large piles of leaves also can freeze once temperatures drop and become roadway hazards.

Pumpkin Smash 2024

Saturday, 11/2 from 9 a.m. to noon METRA Parking Lot on Bartlett Avenue (138 E. Bartlett Avenue)

The Village of Bartlett will be hosting its annual pumpkin composting event with this year's Pumpkin Smash! SCARCE, a nonprofit organization committed to keeping "stuff" out of the landfill by reusing or recycling, first brought this event to DuPage County in 2014! Since then, Bartlett's annual Pumpkin Smash has helped successfully divert approximately 18 tons of pumpkins from landfills.

Residents can bring their pumpkins and jack-o-lanterns for composting in order to return nutrients back to the soil and lower methane gas production in landfills. Regular or decorated pumpkins are allowed, but please remove yarn, stickers or any plastic items before composting. Bartlett School, Final

This year, Bartlett Elementary School is celebrating its 150th year of establishment. The school began in 1874, one year after Bartlett was founded. Initially, it served students in grades 1 through 8.

Classes were first held above a store in town, and Miss Bailey was the first teacher. The school's second location was at the southwest corner of North and Hickory Avenues. In 1929, the school moved to its current location, 111 E. North Avenue.

Imagine a time with no TVs, movies, radios, computers. What did people do for entertainment? This was a period when the school was the social center for pupils and residents alike.

Activities included a 1903 "Calico Social" and literary program. Admission was free to those who wore their "old clothes." Those who dressed up were "fined" 6 cents at the door. A "Basket Social" was held in 1919 with an auction followed by dancing with music by an orchestra. A total of \$52.05 was raised to benefit the school's athletics and library. The park and library districts were decades away from forming.

The holidays were also a time to celebrate. In 1925, an "unique and unusual" Christmas celebration was held for the locals with the pupils entertaining in each of the school's four classrooms. Even Santa Claus made an appearance!

With the arrival of Elvina Ness Brandt in 1927, plays were performed by students, parents, and members of the community under her direction. The new 1929 schoolhouse's gymnasium had a stage for the performances. Today, that room is the school's library.

The P.T.A. oversaw advertising and ticket sales, earmarking the profits for the school's and student's benefit. "Aunt Tillie Goes to Town," "High Flyers," "Nora Nobody," and "Here Comes Charlie," (pictured here) were just some of the theatrical productions performed during Ness Brandt's tenure.
