# Earth Day, Everyday



Since 1970, Earth Day has been celebrated in the United States each year on April 22 to demonstrate support for environmental protection and promotion of harmony with nature. As in the past, the Village of Bartlett with the Bartlett Park District will hold a Community Parks Cleanup Day on Saturday, 4/23 from 9 a.m. to noon. Call 630-837-0800 for more information or to sign up for this event.

After the parks cleanup, head to Bartlett Nature Center, 2054 W. Stearns Road, where the Bartlett Park District is hosting its annual Earth Day event from noon to 4 p.m. Look for the Village arborist and staff from the Building Department there also.

But in addition to joining in these Earth Day specific activities, for the last few years, the Village has been evaluating its environmental practices and policies with a goal of becoming


even more earth friendly everyday. Here are some of the Village's green initiatives and programs:

- \* the Building Department monitors erosion during construction projects and encourages recycling of building waste products
  - \* more than 20,000 annual flowers are planted at Bartlett Hills Golf Course in May and June
  - \* beehives are maintained at the Grounds Department at Bartlett Hills
  - \* holiday lights are accepted for recycling at Village Hall from December through March
- \* the Village promotes recycling through its curbside recycling program with waste hauler Republic Services, through its annual Cleanup Week activities in June and by organizing a communitywide garage sale each year, whereby residents can "re-use" instead of discarding household items and buying new
- \*Public Works began using the more environmentally friendly beet juice instead of calcium chloride for anti-icing
  - \* the monthly prescription drug dropoff program keeps unwanted chemicals out of waterways
  - \* hybrid vehicles are used by Village code
- enforcement officers and inspectors
- \* more than 1200 trees were planted during the past year as part of the Parkway Tree Replacement program
- \* last year, 72 street lights were converted to LED fixtures, and LED compatible fixtures are also being used at Bartlett Hills
- \* green chemicals and cleaning products are being used for routine maintenance at all municipal buildings
- \* a Green Committee at Village Hall provides environmental stewardship and education, including encouraging double-sided copying, replacing styrofoam products with recycled and reusable items and conserving electricity

# **Building Permit? - check!**



Get all the building permit information you need to start your next home improvement project at the Bartlett Park District's annual Earth Day celebration on Saturday, April 23 at Bartlett Nature Center in James "Pate" Philip State Park, 2054 W. Stearns Road. Bartlett Building Department staff will be there from noon to 4 p.m. to answer your building code questions and provide information about the Illinois Energy Conservation Codes. They can guide you through the details for proper permitting so that your home not only looks great when you are done with your project but can be safely enjoyed for many years. There also will be free CFL light bulbs, while supplies last.

Building permits are required because your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with Village codes, the value of your investment is reduced. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. If you decide to sell a home or building that has had modifications without a permit, you may be required to make costly repairs. Also, by following code guide-

lines, the completed project will meet minimum standards of safety and will be less likely to cause injury to you, your family, your friends or future owners.

If you are hiring an outside contractor for your next home project, please make sure whoever you hire is licensed and bonded to work in the Village. For a link to a list of licensed contractors, visit the Building Department page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us.

The Building Department will also be kicking off national Building Safety Month 2016 in May. This year's theme is "Building Codes: Driving Growth through Innovation, Resilience and Safety," with a focus on: 1. Awareness of safe and resilient construction; 2. Fire prevention and disaster mitigation; 3. Water safety and conservation; 4. Energy efficiency and new technologies in the construction industry. # top of the clA+ss

The outstanding performance of **Bartlett High School juniors Sam Witz and Natalie Payne** in the Illinois High School Association's Speech Tournament earned the students fifth place in the recent state competition. Witz and Payne competed in the Dramatic Duet Acting category

"Sam and Natalie are two unbelievably gifted performers," said BHS Speech Coach Anthony Zoubek. "Their Dramatic Duet Acting embodied these flawed characters that compelled and challenged audiences all season long."

The duo performed a pivotal scene from Steven Fechter's play "The Woodsman" and earned several awards en route to the IHSA state finals, including an Upstate-8 Conference championship, an IHSA regional championship and third place in the IHSA sectional honors championship.

This was only the second time a U-46 Speech and Drama team won at the Upstate-8 conference. As a result of the IHSA finals, BHS Speech Team ranks in the top 50 school speech teams in Illinois, placing 39th.

School District U-46 Board of Education recognized Payne and Witz with "Accent on Achievement" certificates in March.

# A Minate with the Mayor

Bartlett's current police station, constructed in 1990, is "in generally good condition" for its age, according to a Police Space Needs Analysis Study prepared for the Village by Williams Architects. However, in terms of size and functionality, it is already "significantly inadequate" to meet the requirements of a growing police department. In addition to space constraints, the aging building was not designed for the technology, equipment and system requirements of a modern law enforcement agency.

Mark Bushhouse, president of Williams Architects, took the Village Board through the report at the February 2 Committee of the Whole meeting. The firm looked at Bartlett's current population and department staffing and projected future growth. It also toured three police facilities in comparable communities and interviewed Bartlett police staff regarding their use of the department's space.

Bartlett's present-day population of 41,700 is expected to exceed 45,000 in the next two to three decades. The current police staff of 77 "may need to grow to approximately 105 members in that timeframe of two to three decades." The building needs to have the flexibility to provide all of the existing services, as well as those services needed in the future, which can be difficult to predict.

The existing police building is 22,900 square feet. Bushhouse believes that an updated Bartlett facility should be approximately 53,500 square feet. The increased space could address the undersized evidence storage area and lockers, the too-small training room and overcrowded offices. It could also provide a better flow for the department's detention zone and for bonding out and exiting detainees from the building.

A second phase of the study looked at the physical condition of the police station. According to the report, "The exterior walls of the facility are in good condition, but the windows need repair and/or replacement and the roof will need to be replaced.

The interior, though well maintained, has become dated and some finishes have become worn. The building's heating/cooling system is at

the end of its useful life and the emergency generator is old and inadequate. The lighting system is inefficient and would need to be totally replaced to meet today's energy codes."



Providing adequate parking for visitors and for village hall and police employees as well as sufficient indoor parking for patrol vehicles is also a concern.

The report offered some preliminary options for the board to consider, including a building that incorporates a basement and two-level addition. This would be constructed in the front visitor parking lot and would allow the existing police station to remain operational during construction. This option adheres to the confines of the property the Village currently owns, without crossing property lines.

Adding a second floor to the existing building is another option. However this choice would involve extensive construction, and it would be costly and disruptive to police department operations. The potential expansion of the boundaries of the facility by acquiring nearby property or even relocating the police station to a completely new site also were raised by the Village Board during this initial review of the study.

Bushhouse stated that police departments are the leaders in municipal government as far as mobile employees and electronic record keeping are concerned. Simultaneously, police departments have specialized space needs within their facilities – for detention areas, for lockups, for interview rooms. Finding the balance between efficiency and need is what the Village Board will be weighing when they continue discussing the future of the Bartlett police facility during upcoming months.

# Water Quality Q&A

Providing safe and reliable tap water in a cost efficient manner is one of the most vital municipal services that the Village of Bartlett provides to its residents and businesses.

### What steps does Bartlett take to assure the safety and quality of its drinking water?

The Village tests and monitors its water on a continual basis in order to ensure compliance with all EPA standards. This regular and routine sampling is done for many substances, including testing for compliance with EPA standards for lead, which has been ongoing since 1992.

### Where can residents find information about Bartlett's water?

A Consumer Confidence Report, which contains information about the source of Bartlett's water, its constituents and the health risks associated with any contaminants, is published each year in the

June/July issue of the Bartletter. The most current report is always available on the Water Quality Report page of the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us.

### What causes my water to be yellow sometimes?

More than a third of the calls to the Public Works water department are in regard to discolored water. Yellow water is caused by iron that has settled into the water main.

Sometimes there is a known cause for the discoloration, such as a main break, a fire-fighting incident or seasonal hydrant flushing. In some cases, it stems from something inside the home, such as iron built up in a water heater or water softening system. There are also times when the exact reason for the discoloration cannot be determined. While this creates an aesthetic problem, you can be assured that it's not an unsafe condition.

The Village samples regularly throughout the month to ensure that there are no harmful bacteria present in the municipal water system. Typically, any incident of discolored water clears up pretty quickly.

If you experience discolored water, contact the Public Works Department at 630-837-0811 so the cause can be determined and the situation can be mitigated.

### What is being done about the mineral hardness of Bartlett's water?

The Village currently purchases approximately 60% of its water from Elgin, which blends well water with water drawn from the Fox River, treats it at its plant and pumps it to Bartlett. The 40% bal-

ance of Bartlett's source water is pumped from Village wells. The water from Elgin and Bartlett's own wells is then blended in the Village's distribution system.

The water that is purchased from Elgin is softened, however Bartlett's well water is not. The Village is currently negotiating a contract with the City of Elgin to supply 100% of Bartlett's water in the future. The Village expects to finalize the agreement in the next few months, which will provide for all Bartlett water to be softened by the end of 2019.

### **Hydrant Flushing**

It's time for Bartlett Public Works to flush all fire hydrants. This process removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly.

The flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Please check for discolored water before doing any laundry during the dates the hydrants in your area are being flushed.

April 11 through April 17: all areas south of Stearns Road

April 18 through April 29: all areas north of Stearns Road



# 125th Anniversary Logo Contest

Luther and Sophia came to the area that would be known as Bartlett in 1843, and in 1873 they contributed 40 acres of their farmland to create a train depot that continues as the Bartlett Depot Museum. The Village's population has grown from 360 to approximately 42,000 residents today. The community continues to show its progress and its pride everyday, and you can show us your version of Bartlett pride by designing an anniversary logo.

The contest is open to all schools and residents who wish to contribute to this great milestone in a great community. The winner will be notified no later than July 1 and will be given credit for the design. The Village of Bartlett will be putting the logo on anniversary apparel and selling it, with the proceeds going to Arts in Bartlett.

### **BRUSH COLLECTION 2016**

The Village of Bartlett chips brush (cut or broken branches) for residents from the beginning of April until the end of November, weather permitting, according to the schedule below. Brush pickup is one of the Village's most popular programs, from a resident participation standpoint, and following a few rules ensures speedy collection and safe working conditions for Public Works employees.

Branches should be stacked neatly at the curb, cut ends facing the street, by the Sunday evening before collection. Thorny bushes, logs and stumps must be stacked separately since they can cause injury to Village employees and equipment.

- \* Branch Length minimum of 2 feet long, maximum of 8 feet long. Must be less than 6 inches in diameter.
- \* Brush must never be piled higher than 4 feet; this obstructs visibility for pedestrians & vehicles.
  - \* Small sticks and evergreen clippings should be put into yard waste bags.

There are no call backs if you miss your collection day. Brush should not be left in the parkway between collection dates. The brush removal program is for owners of single family homes performing work themselves, on their own property; private businesses and townhouse owners with associations that do their maintenance are not eligible for brush pickup. In addition, brush generated by tree services, landscape contractors or other services procured by the homeowner are not eligible for this program. The homeowner must arrange for removal of any contractor-generated brush at their own expense.

Brush piles that do not adhere to chipping requirements will be tagged, explaining why the brush was not removed and what steps to take to correct the problem.

**Garden & Yard Waste** - Garden debris, such as grass clippings, weeds, leaves, soil, rocks, boxes and bags are not brush and will not be picked up by the Village. From April through September, all garden waste must be placed in the specially marked Republic Services bags and placed alongside your household trash and recyclables for the weekly collection. Generic bags can only be used for fall leaf pickup in October and November.
