# **Build!**

First come April showers...followed by May flowers...can thoughts of home improvement projects be far behind? But before you start, get all the information you need for proper permitting so that your home not only looks great when you are done with your project but can be safely enjoyed for many years to come.

Pick up your Home Improvement Guide at the Earth Day celebration at Bartlett Nature Center in James "Pate"

Philip State Park, 2054 W. Stearns Road, on **Saturday, April 26 from noon until 4 p.m.** Bartlett Building Department staff will be available to answer your questions about the Illinois Energy Conservation Codes and can guide you through the permit details for your project. They also will be handing out free CFL light bulbs.

Building permits are required because your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with Village codes, the value of your investment is reduced. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. If you decide to sell a home or building that has had modifications without a permit, you may be required to make costly repairs. Also, by following code guidelines, the completed project will meet minimum standards of safety and will be less likely to cause injury to you, your family, your friends or future owners.

If you are hiring an outside contractor for your next home project, please make sure whoever you hire is licensed and bonded to work in the Village. For a link to a list of licensed contractors, visit the Building Department page on the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us.

### **Senior Utility Tax Rebate**

In March, the Village began mailing utility tax rebate applications to residents who receive a senior discount on their water bills but did not fill out an application for the rebate last year. The senior utility tax rebate application is also available at Village Hall and on the Village website (www.village.bartlett.il.us).

### IF YOU FILLED OUT AN APPLICATION LAST YEAR, YOU DO NOT NEED TO REFILE

To be eligible for the rebate, first time applicants must show that they are 65 or older, have been a resident since May 1, 2013, and hold a natural gas or electricity account in their name.

To apply, submit a completed application, proof of age (waived if you currently receive a senior water bill discount) and a copy of an April 2014 natural gas or electricity bill. If you pay for natural gas or electricity through rent or a homeowners association fee you will need additional documentation to apply, such as a rental agreement or letter from your homeowner's association.

Rebate applications must be delivered to the Village Hall Main Office, put in the parking lot drop box or, if mailed, postmarked no later than June 6, 2014. If mailing, address to: Village of Bartlett, Utility Tax Rebate, 228 S. Main St., Bartlett, IL 60103. Please contact the Main Office, 630-837-0800, with any questions.

# A Minate with the Mayor

Many of you are probably familiar with the old saying that there are only two seasons in the Chicago area -- winter and road construction. Let me share some good news for Bartlett on both of these fronts.

The good news part one is that the great winter of 2013-2014 is finally in our rearview mirror and receding quickly. The "polar vortex" brought record cold and snow our way and kept our Public Works Department working overtime. In January alone, extreme temperatures led to 33 frozen pipe calls to our Water Department. Water personnel also assisted the Streets Department with salting and plowing. PW crews were called out for snow removal and ice control on 36 separate occasions from December through February, including many nights and weekends. A big thank you for all the long hours and hard work of our Public Works Department.

Now the temperatures are going up, the snow and ice have melted and, you guessed it, it's road construction season in the Village.

In April of 2012, the Village approved a \$13.5 million bond issue to pay for a portion of the flood mitigation plan for the Hearthwood Farms area and also to fund a much needed, three-year road improvement project.

The Village's annual Motor Fuel Tax road improvements plan only provides for resurfacing of about two percent of municipal streets each year. This large, three-year bond project would help reduce the backlog of work on the worst pavements, addressing approximately 40 miles of Village roads.

The Village had not issued bonds for its

The flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Please check for discolored water before doing any laundry during the dates the hydrants in your area are being flushed.

Flushing is scheduled for these dates:

April 14 - 24: Area 1 - north of Stearns Road

April 25 - May 1: Area 2 - south of Stearns Road

own purposes in 13 years and was very fortunate to be able to benefit from both a low interest rate environment and its own strong credit rating.

This spring and summer will be



the final year of this three-year project. Last month the Village awarded the road improvement work to Plote Construction, which will perform spot repair of curb and gutter, pavement patching, milling and asphalt resurfacing on Village streets.

So the good news part two is that successful bidding has allowed the Village to greatly exceed the original scope of this project. In the first year, 18 miles of resurfacing was completed and in the second year another 32 miles were done. At the conclusion of the project this summer, the Village will have resurfaced approximately 72 miles of roads over three years. This is half of the 140 total miles of Village streets and about 75 percent more miles of road improvements than we originally anticipated in 2012.

No one likes driving around detours or holding their nose to escape the smell of hot asphalt, but paving over the potholes of this past winter and keeping Village streets in good repair is probably something we can all appreciate.

While I'm sharing good news let me share that the Village has lowered the amount of property taxes it will levy in the fall. The proposed 2014 property tax budget will decrease 3.24% from the 2013 amount. The General Corporate levy will decrease 3.53% and the Police Pension fund will decrease 12.12% due to good investment performance and a lower required contribution. For fiscal year 2014/15, a homeowner with a residence valued at \$300,000 will pay approximately \$861 towards the Village of Bartlett portion of their property tax bill.

Finally, in an effort to more easily share Bartlett's financial and other information, the Village has added a link to a new Transparency Page on the Village website. This improvement has earned the Village a grade of 90.6 out of 100 from the Illinois Policy Institute and made us eligible for a sunshine award, which is given to the most transparent municipalities.



### **Did You Know?**

...that Illinois celebrates Arbor Day each year on the last Friday in April and that the state tree is the White Oak?

Arbor Day originated in Nebraska, where in 1872 journalist and tree-planting advocate J. Sterling Morton first proposed a tree-planting holiday at a meeting of the State Board of Agriculture. The date was set for April 10, 1872. Prizes were offered to counties and individuals for planting properly the largest number of trees on that day. It was estimated that more than one million trees were planted in Nebraska on the first Arbor Day.

Today the most common date for the observance of Arbor Day is the last Friday in April, and several U.S. presidents have proclaimed a national Arbor Day on that date. But a number of state Arbor Days are at other times to coincide with the best tree planting weather. Arbor Day dates range from January and February in the south to May in the far north.

### **New Scam Alerts for Residents**

Bartlett residents are being warned about two recent scams that have been reported to the police department. Several residents have received calls from international telephone numbers on their cellular phones. The caller will ring your cellular telephone number and then immediately disconnect, hoping that you are curious enough to redial the missed number. If the cell phone owner returns the call, they are often charged an international calling rate of \$19.95.

Other residents have reported receiving a telephone call from someone claiming to work for Microsoft and warning them about a virus on their



computer. The caller then offers to remove the virus and asks you to authorize remote access to your computer. Once the scammer has accessed your computer, they can install malicious software, steal personal information or direct you to fraudulent websites.

### **Prescription Drug Dropoff Reminder**

Prescription drug use is on the rise, and very often teenagers do not have to go any farther than the family medicine cabinet to find these types of drugs.



Residents can safely dispose of leftover medications by taking advantage of Bartlett's free, monthly prescription drug dropoff. Unused and expired prescription drugs, OTC medications and sharps can be brought to Village Hall, 228 S. Main Street, from 9 a.m. until noon on the last Saturday of each month. Items accepted in the program include non-controlled prescription drugs, over-the-counter medications, liquid medication in leak-proof containers, pet medications, vitamins/supplements, ointments, lotions, homeopathic remedies, suppositories and sharps, such as needles and syringes.

No controlled substances or personal care items will be accepted. Thermometers, IV bags, bloody and infectious waste, empty containers, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans and full inhalers are also not acceptable.



### **BRUSH COLLECTION 2014**



Area A -- 1st and 3rd Mondays: Homes located south of the Metra/Soo railroad tracks and west of Main St./S. Bartlett Road.

The Village of Bartlett chips brush (cut or broken branches) for residents from the beginning of April until the end of November, according to the schedule on the left. Brush pickup is one of the Village's most popular programs, from a resident participation standpoint, and following a few rules ensures speedy collection and safe working conditions for Public Works employees.

Branches should be stacked neatly at the curb, cut ends facing the street, by the Sunday evening before collection. Thorny bushes, logs and stumps must be stacked separately since they can cause injury to Village employees and equipment.

- \* Branch Length minimum of 2 feet long, maximum of 8 feet long. Must be less than 6 inches in diameter.
- \* Brush must never be piled higher than 4 feet; this obstructs visibility for pedestrians & vehicles.
- \* Small sticks and evergreen clippings should be put into yard waste bags.

There are no call backs if you miss your collection day. Brush should not be left in the parkway between collection dates. The brush removal program is for owners of single family homes performing work themselves, on their own property; private businesses and townhouse owners with associations that do their maintenance are not eligible for brush pickup. In addition, brush generated by tree services, landscape contractors or other services procured by the homeowner are not eligible for this program. The homeowner must arrange for removal of any contractor-generated brush at their own expense.

Brush piles that do not adhere to chipping requirements will be tagged, explaining why the brush was not removed and what steps to take to correct the problem.

Garden debris, such as grass clippings, weeds, leaves, soil, rocks, boxes and bags are not brush and will not be picked up by the Village. This type of garden waste must be placed in the specially marked Republic Services bags and placed alongside your household trash and recyclables for the weekly collection.

### From the Archives



It is said that April showers bring May flowers and what stylish lady doesn't want to keep her hairdo protected from the spring rain.

Former Bartlett resident Fern Van Alstine Hill ran for Village clerk in 1973. One hundred dollars was donated to her election fund. She used the money to advertise in the Elgin Daily-Courier and to purchase and personalize rain bonnets, which she used as campaign handouts.

Though Hill was unsuccessful in her bid, one of her rain bonnets was saved by Bartlett resident Shirley Whitmer, who recently donated it to the Bartlett History Museum. Hill also saved a bonnet and continues to use it today.

# Passport to Adventure Starts May 1
