# A Minute with the Mayor

The Village Board is currently in the process of reviewing and approving its proposed budget for fiscal year 2015-2016. In addition to being a financial planning tool for the Village Board and staff, the budget is an important communications document for Bartlett taxpayers.

Produced annually at this time, the municipal budget is a road map for how your tax dollars will be spent in the upcoming year, and the trustees and I are always working to make sure that road map is clearly marked. We continually review and improve policies that impact municipal spending. A recently approved ordinance that establishes guidelines and requirements for providing public funds to civic organizations is a good example.

The Village of Bartlett is fortunate to have numerous not-for-profit community organizations providing desirable services that benefit our residents. Historically, some of these organizations have requested and received tax dollars or public funds to help support their efforts. Since the Village must ensure it is at all times accountable for public funds, a process and application for funding request form have been developed. The new guidelines add structure to the distribution of these small grants and provide for greater transparency by documenting what services will be provided and more clearly communicating the benefits to the Bartlett community.

Groups, such as the Bartlett Fourth of July Committee, Bartlett Heritage Days and Arts in Bartlett, to name just a few, are wonderful organizations that enrich our community by providing

services, programs and public events that the Village does not provide. The intent of the new ordinance, which becomes effective June 1, is not to stop our support for these vital community groups, but to formalize the procedure for committing public funds to them.

You don't have to look any further than the civic groups page on the Village website, [www.village.bartlett.il.us/our-community/civic-organizations](http://www.village.bartlett.il.us/our-community/civic-organizations), or the Bartlett Briefs page in each issue of the Bartletter to see the names of some of these groups and how they serve and strengthen our Village. And we can support them not only with our dollars, but with our time.

Have you always enjoyed the Fourth of July celebration and parade in Bartlett? Volunteer with the Fourth of July Committee or join the Bartlett Lions Club. Attend the Bartlett Woman's Club Fashion Show and help this group's community scholarship fund. Attend an event at the Arts in Bartlett Center to show your support for the cultural arts and to ensure that Bartlett's annual summer Festival of the Arts continues to thrive.

A well thought-through municipal budget keeps Bartlett financially sound, but it's good community citizens that participate in and support our civic and not-for-profit groups that elevate the quality of life in the Village.

## Beware of Income Tax Telephone Scam

If you receive a phone call from someone claiming to be an IRS agent or from the U.S. Treasury Department telling you there is a problem with your tax return or that you owe back taxes, be wary because this is a common income tax scam. The Bartlett Police Department warns that these scam artists will often threaten to arrest you or demand immediate payment with a prepaid debit card, a prepaid Green Dot MoneyPak card, or a wire transfer such as Western Union.

Please be aware that the IRS will always contact you first by mail or by a personal visit from field agents. The IRS will never ask for credit card, debit card, or prepaid card information over the telephone.

It's time for Bartlett Public Works to flush all fire hydrants. This process removes iron deposits from the water mains and ensures that hydrants are working correctly.

The flushing may cause temporary water discoloration. Please check for discolored water before doing any laundry during the dates the hydrants in your area are being flushed.

**April 13 through April 19:** all areas south of Stearns Road  
**April 20 through May 1:** all areas north of Stearns Road

pup's gender. In spring, young males are kicked out of the pack and have to look for their own territories.

Do not make it comfortable around your home for a coyote by providing food and shelter. Always keep your cat indoors and your dog on a leash. Pick up your small dog if you see a coyote while walking. Never turn your back and run away; calmly walk away while facing the coyote.

If you do encounter an aggressive coyote, change direction as you could be near their den. Carry an air horn, whistle, walking stick, cane or other deterrent. Be big, loud and bold. Throw sticks or clumps of dirt at the ground by its feet. Aim for its body, if necessary, but never its head.



## Building Permit? -- check



Get all the building permit information you need to start your next home improvement project at the Bartlett Park District's annual Earth Day celebration on Saturday, April 25 at Bartlett Nature Center in James "Pate" Philip State Park, 2054 W. Stearns Road. Bartlett Building Department staff will be there from noon to 4 p.m. to answer your building code questions and provide information about the Illinois Energy Conservation Codes. They can guide you through the details for proper permitting so that your home not only looks great when you are done with your project but can be safely enjoyed for many years. There also will be free CFL light bulbs, while supplies last.

Building permits are required because your home or business is an investment. If your construction project does not comply with Village codes, the value of your investment is reduced.

Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections. If you decide to sell a home or building that has had modifications without a permit, you may be required to make costly repairs. Also, by following code guidelines, the completed project will meet minimum standards of safety and will be less likely to cause injury to you, your family, your friends or future owners.

If you are hiring an outside contractor for your next home project, please make sure whoever you hire is licensed and bonded to work in the Village. 

# BRUSH COLLECTION 2015



**Area A -- 1st and 3rd Mondays: Homes located south of the Metra/Soo railroad tracks and west of Main St./S. Bartlett Road.**

The Village of Bartlett chips brush (cut or broken branches) for residents from the beginning of April until the end of November, according to the schedule on the left. Brush pickup is one of the Village's most popular programs, from a resident participation standpoint, and following a few rules ensures speedy collection and safe working conditions for Public Works employees.

Branches should be stacked neatly at the curb, cut ends facing the street, by the Sunday evening before collection. Thorny bushes, logs and stumps must be stacked separately since they can cause injury to Village employees and equipment.

\* **Branch Length - minimum of 2 feet long, maximum of 8 feet long. Must be less than 6 inches in diameter.**

\* **Brush must never be piled higher than 4 feet; this obstructs visibility for pedestrians & vehicles.**

\* **Small sticks and evergreen clippings should be put into yard waste bags.**

There are no call backs if you miss your collection day. Brush should not be left in the parkway between collection dates. The brush removal program is for owners of single family homes performing work themselves, on their own property; private businesses and townhouse owners with associations that do their maintenance are not eligible for brush pickup. In addition, brush generated by tree services, landscape contractors or other services procured by the homeowner are not eligible for this program. The homeowner must arrange for removal of any contractor-generated brush at their own expense.

Brush piles that do not adhere to chipping requirements will be tagged, explaining why the brush was not removed and what steps to take to correct the problem.

Garden debris, such as grass clippings, weeds, leaves, soil, rocks, boxes and bags are not brush and will not be picked up by the Village. This type of garden waste must be placed in the specially marked Republic Services bags and placed alongside your household trash and recyclables for the weekly collection.



## From the Archives



Ray Winesburg was in business in Elgin for 13 years before he purchased the late William Bull's meat and grocery store, 116 Bartlett Avenue, in 1950. Bull, who died in 1949, built the store in 1924 and he and his family lived above it.

Winesburg hoped to give Bull's customers "the same courteous and efficient service" they had been receiving for many years. This plastic pencil holder promotional giveaway measures 3 inches tall by 2 1/4 inches wide and affixes to a wall.

After Winesburg's ownership, the building continued as Vendl Grocery & Market and then as the first location of the Bartlett Food Basket.
