Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety

A resident recently emailed and suggested that since the number of bicyclists in the Village seems to be increasing, it might be a good time for a refresher on sharing the roadways. Here are some cyclist and pedestrian safety tips for drivers from www.cyberdriveillinois.com.

- Drivers must yield the right-of-way to a bicyclist just as they would to another vehicle.
- Bicyclists should travel just to the right of faster moving traffic. However, drivers need to be aware that certain hazards such as rough surfaces, debris, drainage grates or a narrow traffic lane may require bike riders to move toward the center of the lane.
 - Motorists must pass a cyclist slowly and leave at least three feet of passing space.
 - Crowding or threatening a bicyclist is prohibited.
 - A motorist should not park or drive in marked bicycle lanes.
- When following bicyclists, give them plenty of room and be prepared to stop quickly. Use extra caution during rainy and icy weather. At night do not use high beams when you see an oncoming biker.
 - After parking and before opening vehicle doors, a motorist should first check for bicyclists.
- When a motorist is turning left and there is a bicyclist entering the intersection from the opposite direction, the driver should wait for the bicyclist to pass before making the turn. Also, if a motorist is sharing the left turn lane with a bicyclist, stay behind them until they have safely completed their turn.
- If a motorist is turning right and a bicyclist is approaching on the right, let the bicyclist go through the intersection first before making a right turn. Remember to always signal when turning.

A driver must come to a complete stop (and yield):

- When a pedestrian is in a marked crosswalk.
- On school days, when children are in close proximity to a school zone crosswalk.

A driver must yield to a pedestrian

- When a pedestrian is in an unmarked crosswalk on the driver's side of the roadway and there
 are no traffic control signals.
 - · When making a turn at any intersection.
 - When making a lawful turn on a red light after coming to a complete stop.
 - After coming to a complete stop at a stop sign or flashing red signal at an intersection.
 - When a pedestrian enters a crosswalk before the traffic light changed.
 - When a pedestrian is walking with a green light, to a walking person symbol or a walk signal.
- When a pedestrian is leaving or entering a street or highway from an alley, building, private road or driveway.
 - When a pedestrian is entering an intersection with a flashing yellow arrow.

Drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians are all responsible for following traffic rules and for safely sharing the Village roadways.

Back to School Safety Reminders

The Bartlett Police Department urges motorists to slow down and exercise extra caution when students return to school on Monday, 8/17. Drivers are reminded to obey school speed zone signs, refrain from using their cell phones and pay extra attention to students walking to and from school. Please be mindful of school buses picking up and dropping off near schools and in residential neighborhoods. Also be aware that congestion near schools increases during these first few weeks of the school year, so allow a bit longer for your daily commute.

Students who walk to and from school are encouraged to always look both ways before crossing the street, obey the school crossing guards and watch for turning vehicles. Be especially alert during inclement weather, and walk with a parent, sibling, friend or a neighbor.

The Bartlett Police will conduct extra patrols near elementary schools and in surrounding neighborhoods during the first few weeks of school. The department will also increase traffic enforcement activities in school speed zones.

Traffic Advisory – Lions Labor Day Dash

Child Safety Seats

The Bartlett Police Department offers a free program that teaches Bartlett



residents how to properly install child safety seats in their vehicles. This program entails a community service officer (CSO) demonstrating the proper way to install a child safety seat in the participant's vehicle. After the CSO demonstration, the seat is removed and the participant reinstalls it in their vehicle.

The police department has four CSOs who are certified child safety seat installers. Bartlett residents who wish to participate in this program are asked to call 630-837-0846 to schedule an appointment. Normally, child safety seat installations are scheduled between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. The appointment time for one child safety seat is approximately one hour. Participation in this program is limited to Bartlett residents only.

Child passenger safety tips and information pertaining to child safety seats can also be found in the police department's child safety seat brochure, which is available on the Police Department page of the Village website, www.village.bartlett.il.us.

Did You Know?

...that your garbage and recycling toters cannot be stored in front of the house.

Republic Services picks up garbage weekly on Tuesdays. Your toters may be placed at the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. on the day preceding pickup. Empty containers must be removed no later than 9 a.m. the day following pickup and stored in the garage or in the side or rear yard.

Also, a quick reminder that Republic Services provides free fall leaf collection using generic yard bags only during October and November. **Republic Services** yard waste bags are required for garden debris, such as small sticks, evergreen clippings, grass clippings, weeds, leaves, soil and rocks during the April 1 to November 30 yard waste season.

Fall 2015 Parkway Tree Program

Through its long-running Parkway Tree Program, the Village of Bartlett has shared the cost of planting trees with homeowners in an effort to reforest Bartlett's parkways as well as diversify the number of species planted.

You are only eligible to purchase a tree if you had a tree removed from your parkway or have the space for one to be planted. Trees should be spaced 30 to 40 feet apart. Planting locations will be determined by the Village.

The tree species available are listed below. All trees are 2-inches in diameter, at a cost of \$50 per tree. **Orders are filled on a first come, first serve basis.** If the tree you order sells out, you will be contacted to make another selection. Trees will be planted by November 25 unless notified otherwise.

Swamp White Oak: Native shade tree with lustrous, heavy textured leaves. Maximum height and spread of 45 feet with a rounded, open form. Adaptable to wet, poorly drained soils and drought tolerant. Yellowish brown to reddish fall color. Regal Prince Oak: Beautiful oak with a narrow and upright, columnar shape. Mature height is 45 feet with spread of 20 feet. Summer foliage is glossy, bright green that fades to yellow in the fall. Royal Raindrops Crabapple: Disease resistant crabapple with upright, spreading form that reaches a height of 20 feet. Bright pinkish red flowers combine with deep purple cutleaf foliage for an excellent display in the spring. Fall color is orange red. Tiny red fruits persist through fall and winter. Black Gum Tupelo: Attractive native tree with high-gloss, dark green summer leaves. Spectacular fall foliage with many shades of yellow, orange, bright red, purple or scarlet that may appear on the same branch. Fissured grey bark provides winter interest. Grows up to 40 feet in height with a spread of 20 feet. Adaptable to urban conditions including compacted and poorly drained soils and occasional drought.

Japanese Tree Lilac: A smaller sized tree that reaches a height and spread of 20 feet. It produces large clusters of creamy white, fragrant flowers in late spring, early summer. Drought resistant. Espresso Kentucky Coffee Tree: This seedless male variety has an oval to vase like shape. Mature height is 50 feet with a spread of 35 feet.

Good tolerance of heat, drought, and cold. Triumph Elm: Strong, upright branching shade tree with a sturdy, symmetrical growth habit. Fast growing to 55 foot height and spread of 45 feet. Dark green and glossy foliage with yellow fall color. Disease and pest resistant; drought tolerant. **Hackberry:** Tough native tree, tolerant of climatic conditions and urban abuse. Reaches height of 45 feet. Light green leaves fade to yellow in fall. Rough, corky bark adds interest, resists damage. **Princeton Sentry Ginkgo:** Stiffly upright branches form a slender, pyramidal crown with a mature height of 45 feet and spread of only 15. A male, fruitless variety that is pest resistant and adaptable to urban conditions. Bright yellow fall color. **Yellowwood:** Shorter native shade tree (30 feet) with rounded shape. Cascades of fragrant white blooms in May and June. Brilliant yellow fall color. Redpointe Maple: Fast growing red maple hybrid with a broadly pyramidal shape. Maximum size is 45 feet with spread of 35. Dark green foliage in the summer changes to brilliant red in the fall. Sienna Glen Maple: This upright tree grows to a height of 50 feet with a spread of 35 feet at maturity. Fall color is a rusty orange to burgundy. It is a hardy, low maintenance tree that requires minimal pruning to maintain its pyramidal form. Due to high demand, only one maple per order

As the clock counts down to Bartlett's 125th birthday in March 2016, the Village of Bartlett Museums start revealing the key moments in the Village's history via its anniversary logo. Watch as the numbers continue to transform. The number two now contains five images:

Public Safety - In 1892, ordinance #39 established the police department. Ordinance #59, in 1897, established the then volunteer fire department. Both departments were very small in the beginning. There was only one police constable to light the street lamps and maintain order in the Village.

Religious diversity - The Congregational Church, Bartlett's first church, was established in 1878. Pictured in the logo is Immanuel United Church of Christ, which is also celebrating its 125th anniversary in 2016. It is Bartlett's oldest continuing congregation on a long and diverse list of religious facilities that make their home in the community today.

Education - School bells first rang in the Village in 1874, when Bartlett School was established. The school, once home to grades 1 through 10, first met above a store, then, in 1876, moved to North and Hickory Avenues. In 1929, it moved to its present location at North and Eastern Avenues.

Public Services - Modern amenities arrived in Bartlett with the telephone in 1902, gas mains in 1916, electricity in 1922, running water in 1923 and a waste water sewer system in 1928.

Commerce - After the railroad helped establish Bartlett in 1873, the town "sprung up as if by magic." The first business was a lumber yard owned by the Bartletts' son. Quickly the Village was home to a general store, butter box factory, blacksmith, shoe maker, wagon maker and much more!

Resident Arlene King recently donated Bartlett Lacrosse Association apparel, images, DVDs and more to the Bartlett History Museum. King was the founder and first president of the association, serving from 2008 to 2010.

In 2007, when King's son Alex and other Bartlett High students expressed an interest in playing lacrosse, King rallied support and on February 11, 2008, the Bartlett Lacrosse Association became official.

During the club's first season, its record was 11-8-1. In 2009, the season record was 13-2, and the club took first place in the NIAX Championship! The club continues today and has won many accolades.

Mosquito Abatement

The Northwest Mosquito Abatement District, 847-537-2306, provides mosquito abatement services to northwest Cook County, including portions of Bartlett. Cook County residents can call to report standing water to the district.

In DuPage County, the Village of Bartlett contracts with Clarke Mosquito, 800-942-2555, to provide mosquito abatement services. Clarke Mosquito uses a four-part process to control the mosquito population.

The first part of the program is aimed at identifying mosquito breeding sites. The second part of the program involves surveillance and monitoring of the mosquito population. Third is the control of larvae. Clarke Mosquito Control treats breeding sites to prevent the development of adult mosquitoes. The larvicides used kill mosquito larva, thereby prevent their maturation into adult mosquitoes. The final step in Bartlett's mosquito control program involves the control of adult mosquito populations. In cases where there are encephalitis alerts or when the nuisance factor becomes excessive, such as after a heavy rainfall, Clarke Mosquito Control may use Ultra Low Volume cold aerosol misting to reduce the adult mosquito population.

As a result of this four-part program, there is no regular schedule for spraying. For more information and helpful links, look for mosquito abatement on the Village website.
