Bells of Peace



“Bells rang, whistles blew and the band played...”

On November 11, 1918, at 11 a.m. Paris time, the armistice went into effect, ending the fighting in World War I. Cook County Herald reported, “Bartlett was the scene of wildest excitement Monday morning, when word reached us that Germany had surrendered. About 3:30 a.m. everybody was out parading the streets. Bells rang, whistles blew and the band played...America and Star Spangled Banner and other National Airs...”

Bartlett had sent 19 of her sons to serve in World War I. The community celebrated the return of its soldiers with a homecoming festival on August 30, 1919. Activities included a parade down Oak Avenue, pictured here, refreshments, baseball games and dancing. Delco Light provided a "ripping moving picture show" and lit Bartlett Park with electric lights for the evening festivities.

One hundred years after the armistice, bells will ring once again in Bartlett. The Bells of Peace, an initiative of the United States World War I Centennial Commission, is encouraging a national tolling of the bells to honor those that served in the Great War, www.worldwar1centennial.org/index.php.

At 11 a.m. on November 11, Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church, 1116 E. Devon Avenue, St. Peter Damian Catholic Church, 131 S. Crest Avenue and Clare Oaks, 825 Carillon Drive, will sound their bells in remembrance.

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Intern Program is a Win! Win! Win!



In partnership with School District U-46 and the Village of Bartlett, the Alignment Collaborative for Education (ACE) -- an organization of business and community leaders who work together to support the school district's goals and priorities -- launched a new internship program this past summer and it was a win all around.

The pilot program was a win for ACE and the school district because it not only met but greatly exceeded some of the goals set for this inaugural effort. Key among those goals is teaching students the skills that will help them succeed in college and the workforce.

It was a win for the seven Bartlett High School students, who spent the summer working with Village of Bartlett staff reviewing municipal construction plans, helping to foster economic development and even investigating non-permitted chickens. While fulfilling their 40-hour internships, these students from Bartlett High's Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) academy gained real world experience.

And it was a big win for the Village, which was seeking to increase public awareness of Village programs and services. Providing these young interns with a behind the scenes look at Bartlett's day-to-day municipal operations was a great way to expose local schools, students and their families to the Village's work in a very meaningful way. This internship is Student Government Day with the volume turned up.

The seven students were selected through a formal application and interview process and then had the opportunity to participate in one of three internships: Engineering, GIS or Local Government.

The engineering interns Meher Mirza and Sareena Shah shadowed the Village engineer going out on storm sewer inspections, soil/erosion inspections, meetings on the transition to Lake Michigan water and much more.

The GIS interns Patricia Marasigan and Britney Yu used GPS units to collect "edge of pavement" and "back of curb" points and completed impervious surface drawings.

The three Local Government interns Ishan Desai, Emily Hettinger and Azam Kahn worked with multiple departments on their projects. They created a digital and print welcome packet for new residents, created "Bartlett Business Spotlight" videos and worked with code enforcement to create a set of instructions for the Village's code enforcement software.

These impressive students gave the municipality long-lasting, quality work, and the Village was pleased to be able to recognize them and thank them for their contributions at a recent Village Board meeting. The Village is extremely grateful to U-46 and ACE for helping to set up this incredible opportunity and looks forward to continuing this program in the future.



Timeout with the Trustees

The third planned, incremental increase in water rates will begin with the May 2019 bills. The rate per 1,000 gallons of water will be \$11.76, up from \$9.70. This increase will occur at approximately the same time that the construction for the Lake Michigan water transition is completed and project loan payments begin.

In our effort to remain transparent, we have continued to share information on the Village website (see “Bartlett’s Drinking Water” webpage) and on social media accounts. We understand that the recent increases in the water rates have raised concerns, and we want to address some of the comments and questions that have been raised.

On Facebook (FB): “Should have just left the water alone.”

Bartlett has been purchasing approximately 60% of its water from the City of Elgin with the balance of the source water pumped from Village wells. The contract with Elgin expires in 2019.

With that deadline in mind, we began weighing future water source options in 2014. Five alternatives were considered at that time and all five options came with increases to the water rate and necessary infrastructure improvements.

On FB: “...I can’t believe how bad this water is also. What are we paying for??”

In January 2016, the Village was pursuing an agreement for 100% water from Elgin, but by October 2016 we still were not able to reach an agreement with Elgin. Some sticking points were disagreements over minimum take requirements and rates, as well as the Fox River algae bloom during summer 2016 that caused taste and odor issues. This also had occurred in 2013.

In February 2017, the Village Board changed course and finalized an agreement to join the DuPage Water Commission (DWC) in order to purchase Lake Michigan water.

The November 2016 study that influenced

that decision shows that if the Village had moved to 100% Elgin water, there would have been only a 6-cent difference in the 2019 rate per 1,000 gallons, (\$11.70 for 100% Elgin water versus the \$11.76 rate starting in May 2019). The study further shows that the current rate the Village is looking at, \$11.76, is \$1.44 lower than the original rate estimated for water through the DWC.

On FB: “So why are you charging us money now for water we don’t even get yet?”

The recent rate hikes follow a five-year period (2012 to 2017) when water rates remained unchanged. However the move to Lake Michigan water requires major infrastructure improvements that are being funded by the increases.

The \$43.6 million project includes an initial capital buy-in to join DWC and installation of 20,000 feet of 30-inch water main from Roselle to Bartlett. It further consists of the construction of two 1,500,000 gallon ground storage tanks; a water booster station with seven pumps; a sodium hypochlorite feed system with three chemical feed pumps; installation of more than 1,000 linear feet of water main of varying diameters; and a water metering station that will connect Bartlett with the DWC and Lake Michigan.

Once completed in May 2019, Bartlett will have a safe, reliable and high quality water source.

Bring Your Pop Tabs to the Police Department

Last school year, Bartlett High School, Eastview Middle School and the Bartlett Police Department, with the help of the Bartlett community, collected pop tabs from open soda cans, soup cans, and other aluminum cans to help support the Ronald McDonald House Charities in Winfield.



Ronald McDonald House Charities have a Pop Tab Collection Program, in which they recycle pop tabs as scrap metal for funds. On average, Ronald McDonald house receives \$40 to \$55 per pound of aluminum pop tabs.

During 2018, Bartlett submitted 59.65 lbs of pop tabs, which nearly tripled the amount from the previous year.

This program provides a terrific opportunity for students, the community and the police to work together and make a genuine contribution that helps area families in need.

Prescription Drug Dropoff

The Village of Bartlett periodically collects unused prescription drugs and OTC medications for safe disposal. The next Prescription Drug Dropoff event will be on Saturday, 10/27 from 9 a.m. to noon. There will not be another collection until January 2019.

Residents can drop items off inside Village Hall. Medications accepted in the program include, non-controlled prescription and OTC drugs, liquid medication in leak-proof containers, pet medications, vitamins, ointments, lotions, homeopathic remedies and suppositories. Proof of Bartlett residency is required.

Halloween Trick-or-Treat



Bartlett has set Halloween trick-or-treat hours for 3 to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, 10/31. Please remember to turn on your porch light if you will be passing out Halloween candy.

The Bartlett Police Department encourages parents to accompany children or have them go out with a large group of friends and to stay in their immediate neighborhoods. It also is a good idea for children to carry glow sticks or flashlights when trick-or-treating during the evening hours and only go to homes where the porch light is on.

Trick-or-treaters should always walk on the sidewalk. If there are no sidewalks, walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic. Motorists are reminded to drive carefully and watch out for children crossing the roadways.

Costumes are a fun part of this holiday but only if worn safely. Costumes should be simple, flame resistant and, if possible, light-colored. Reflective tape can be added for extra visibility. Plan to use non-allergenic makeup instead of masks, and keep wigs and hats well off the face. Finally, children are reminded to bring their Halloween candy home and to have an adult examine all treats before eating.

Recycling 101



Bartlett residents are supplied a 35- or 65-gallon recycling cart for unlimited weekly collection. Place carts four feet apart with the handles facing the house along with your other refuse.

All materials may be mixed together for curbside recycling. Paper may be placed in paper bags (optional). Flatten all corrugated cardboard and paperboard boxes. Remove any non-paper packing material. Rinse all recyclables free of food residue and remove lids. It is okay to leave the caps on your plastic containers. Here is a quick refresher for items accepted for recycling:

PAPER

- ~ Newspaper (with inserts)
- ~ Magazines/catalogs
- ~ Telephone directories
- ~ Office/school paper
- ~ Advertising/junk mail
- ~ Kraft brown paper bags
- ~ Corrugated cardboard
- ~ Paperboard/chipboard, such as cereal boxes, pasta boxes, clothing boxes, tissue boxes

For the Love of Recycling:

- DO NOT recycle wire hangers; please return to your cleaners
- DO NOT recycle mirrors, light-bulbs, window glass or ceramics in recycling container.
- DO NOT include soiled paper fibers, such as oily pizza boxes, paper napkins, etc.
- DO NOT recycle batteries
- DO NOT include styrofoam, wood, plastic film, plastic bags,

plastic toys or diapers in recycling containers.

DO NOT recycle electronics in your recycling cart. Groot offers unlimited electronic waste (e-waste) collection directly from your home; however, you must call in advance to schedule a pick-up and make arrangements, 847-429-7370.

PLASTIC

All plastic bottles and containers with these symbols underneath:



Examples are: plastic beverage and food containers; milk, water and juice bottles; liquid detergent, fabric softener, bleach, shampoo; yogurt cups; vegetable oil bottles

METAL

- ~ Aluminum cans
- ~ Steel or tin cans

GLASS

- ~ Bottles and jars only; brown, green and clear glass.

ASEPTIC PACKAGING

- ~ Juice boxes.
- ~ Milk cartons

Free Leaf Collection

For the health and safety of Bartlett residents, leaf burning has been prohibited in the Village since 1991. To help with the abundance of leaves each autumn, the Village's contract with Groot Industries provides for leaf collection at no additional cost to residents during October and November.



Leaves should be placed in brown paper yard bags at the curb each Tuesday alongside other household refuse and recyclables. DO NOT put leaves in plastic bags; these will not be collected. You DO NOT need to buy Groot yard waste stickers for

leaves. Generic yard waste bags without stickers are accepted. However, all other yard waste, such as grass clippings, pulled weeds, etc., must still be placed in stickered yard bags for collection.

Branches/brush must be bundled in 2 feet by 2 feet by 4 foot long bundles, and is collected weekly through November.

Village ordinance prohibits any person from depositing, raking, shoveling, plowing, blowing or dumping any leaves, grass clippings, branches, snow, onto any public parkway, gutter or street. Excess leaves and lawn clippings can obstruct sewers and cause flooding. Large piles of leaves also can freeze once temperatures drop and become roadway hazards.

It Was a Crime to Be German

Book burnings...physical attacks upon immigrants...vandalism of immigrant-owned property...proliferation of irrational fear and hatred. One hundred years ago, incidents such as these took place right here in Illinois.

The United States was involved in the “Great War,” and some Illinoisans considered anything German to be evil – including their fellow residents of German descent. Bartlett was almost entirely a Germanic community then.

Join the Bartlett History Museum on Tuesday, 11/13 for “It Was a Crime to Be German,” held at Bartlett Village Hall, 228 S. Main Street. Through first person costume portrayal, historical actor Barbara Kay will depict her great-grandmother Margaret May, a resident of southern Illinois, who saw and felt anti-German hysteria a century ago. Kay will illustrate her presentation with photographs, newspaper headlines and editorial cartoons of the time, bringing the struggles of World War I-era German Illinoisans to life.

The presentation begins at 7 p.m. with doors opening at 6:30 p.m. for refreshments and preprogram talk. Registration is required for this free event. Contact Pam Rohleder at prohleder@vbartlett.org with your name, phone number and number of attendees or call 630-837-0800.

Kay is part of the Statewide Road Scholars Speakers Series. This event is being produced through a partnership with Illinois Humanities that is supported in part by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and the Illinois General Assembly (through the Illinois Arts Council, a state agency), as well as contributions from individuals, foundations and corporations.



World War I Walk

Nineteen Yanks left for military service from Bartlett’s original train depot during World War I, heading to training camps in the south and, for most, combat overseas.
